Report of Inspecter Robt. Howe on Last Year's Test of Fire Apparatus Just to Hand—Some of the More Important Requests Already Complied With by Council and Commissioners.

Helow we present in condensed form the objections noted by Mr. Robert Howe, Inspector Canadian Fire Underwriters' Association, in his report on "Municipal Fire Preventive Appliances in the Town of Lindsay, Ont., as on July 17th, 1905," The report, was considered at last Thursday's meeting of the Water Commissioners;

· · · · Nearest hydrant to Pump House is about 750 feet distant, ANOTH-ER should be placed not exceeding half that distance.

"Engines and pumps, in duplicate, made about the year 1892 by Dean Steam Pump Co., Holyoke, Mass., in good condition, capacity 900,000 gaflons each or 1,800,000 Imperial gallons total per 24 hours and INADE-QUATE, the Standard requirement being that the pumps shall be of such number and capacity as in the event of the disability of any one pump will always leave a rate of 2,600,000 gallons per day immediately available. Both pumps have to run together in the event of any serious fire, and it is clear that in the event of a destructive fire their united capacity would be seriously inadequate for Standard service. Consumtion of water averages about 540,000 gallons of water per 24 hours.

Two boilers rated 75 h.p. each, made in about 1892 by John Inglis & Sons, Toronto, in good condition and marked alternately. No relief valve on pumps, no automatic steam or water pressure recording gages, BOTH OF WHICH ARE REQUIRED by the Standard.

"Standpipe, 138,000 gals, capacity, gives 65 pounds pressure in business centre when full, is to be shut off on every alarm by means of a hand valve operated by a man who lives about 100 feet distant, and has telenhone connection with Pump House; Standard requires all such standpipes to be SHUT OFF AUTOMATICALLY by means of a switch from Pump House or Fire Hall,

"Mains are said to be laid six feet under cover and to consist of 1700 £t. of 12 inch, 4500 ft. of 10 inch, 5,080 ft. of 8 inch, 19,220 ft. of 6 inch, and 5,910 ft. of 4 inch, a total of 36,410. ANOTHER VALVE should be placed on the 6 inch main which crosses the river at Mill-st. During several years all extensions of mains appear to consist of 4 inch diameter, which size is too small where fire protection is intended and SHOULD BE DISCONTINUED, as recommended in previous reports; no mains smaller than 6 inch are contemplated by the Standard.

"River is crossed by 6 inch mains at Bond and Mill-sts.; the latter is just stretched through the river without any support, which, to say the least, is VERY UNSATISFACTORY, and is without a gate valve on one side of the river.

"Large draughts for railway purposes are taken by the G.T. and C.P. grailways in a manner which is liable to interfere seriously with the pressure, and although it is said that such supplies would be shut off in the event of fire the arrangement cannot be regarded as satisfactory. THE STANDARD REQUIRES that all such supplies shall be taken from tanks having small supply pipes, the inlet from which will be CLOSED AUTOMATICALLY when tanks are full of water.

"Hydrants are 79 in number, average about 300 ft. apart in business section, where none should exceed 259 ft; about 300 to 600 feet in other built up parts according to proximity of buildings; only two with frost jackets, 78 drained into loose stones and 1 into street sewer; ground full of water and HYDRANT DRAINAGE UNSATISFACTORY; the town badly in need of suitable sewerage system, the lack of which renders the hydrants liable to derangement; said to be fested monthly the year round; one found frozen last winter was thawed by hot water, for which purpose a PORTABLE STEAM BOILER should be owned by the town; of eight opened during the tests five were in good condition, two in need of packing, and one leaked so badly that it could not be tested. Runming pressure at corner of Lindsay and Kent-sts, was found with five streams to be 78 pounds at hydran's pumping direct with standpipe shut

"Hose-2000 ft. of first-class; Standard requires atl east 3,000 ft., all first-class. Six play pipes, representing the number of steams that could be made available during fire should be increased to AT LEAST EIGHT.

"Hook and ladder truck and equipment in good condition but only taken out on special occasions instead of immediately following every alarm of fire from business and congested parts. Winter sleighs for borne wagon, none for book and ladder truck or reel.

"Fire Station-stable room for four horses, but only two horses there by might at present and none by day. Hose tower 50 ft. in height below the suspenders, should have been at least 55 ft. to comply with the Standard, as has been PREVIOUSLY recommended. General fire alarm bell on Fire Station, but has to be pulled by hand.

"Fire Brigade consists of 13 men all told; Standard requires an organized brigade to consist of AT LEAST TWENTY MEN, and that those not sleeping in the Fire Hall shall have alarm gongs in dwellings; at present none of those sleeping out of Fire Hall have gongs in dwellings; drill practises, with tests of appliances, appear to be usually held fortnightly and sometimes weekly during summer, with average attendance of nine, as shown by notes which the secretary carries in his pocket, but which the Standard requires shall be permanently recorded in a suitable book kept for the purpose in the Fire Hall.

Horses-two owned by the Municipality, employed on street work by day at said to be not exceeding 3000 feet from Fire Hall. SYSTEM IS NOT SATISFACTORY, and I may here say the increase in population and importance of the town are such as appear to require a team of properly trained horses to be constantly in Fire Hall by, day and two by night.

"Fire Alarm Telegraph having eight street boxes; the number should be increased and the system made to OPERATE a suitable GEN-ERAL ALARM BELL-presesnt Fire Hall bell has to be pulled by hand. Ropes on two additional bells in other parts of the town found broken and incapable of service.

"One chemical fire extinguisher was tested; horizontal throw not measured; duration of discharge, five minutes - two slow to be satis-

IMPROVEMENTS UNDER WAY.

In connection with the above list of fire system deficiencies, it is satisfactory to be able to note that Council had already taken steps to improve the general alarm bell service, and the purchase of the second fire team had also been decided on before Inspector Howe's report come to hand. Likewise the Commissioners had agreed to place a gate on the river pipe line at Mill-st. No doubt a number of other defiencies will be remedied in the near future .- Ed. Post.

"He is a man of mediam size, whose appearance indicates both great sweetness and such as amount of dignity that one feels in looking at him that he must love him, and "His hair, down to his ears, is of the color of ripe walnuts and hangs blond and clear mass; it is parted in the middle, after the fashion of the Nazarenes. His bear, of the same color as his hair, is curly, and although not very long, is parted in
