Many Reports Presented by Warden Parkin—Agricultural Class Approved and Financially Supported—Other Business.

WEDNESDAY'S DOINGS

Moved by Mr. Fielding, seconded by Mr. Callan, that the Finance and Assessment Committee be instructed to report on the advisability of painting the Forest House and North bridge in Bobcaygeon.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Watson, seconded by Mr. Grant, that the Finance and Assessment Committee be instructed to report on the advisability of giving a rebate to Eldon township on account of the County stone crusher, as they have purchased one of their own.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bezz, seconded by Mr. Jordan, that the committee on County Property report on the advisability of building granolithic walks on the south and east sides of the County buildings.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Watson, that the standing committee on Roads and Bridges report on the advisability of giving a supplementary grant to Dalton township to finish Gibber's bridge.—Carried.

Your committee recommended that the chairman be authorized to build granolithic walks on Front-st., to the Registry Office and on Gilbert's bridge-st. from the corner of Front-st., these walks to be six feet wide and to connect with walks already built or to be built on the Court House grounds, conditional, however, on the consent of the Council of the town of Lindsay being secured for the work on the streets.

Your committee recommended that concrete steps be built to the Registry Office door, in addition to the other like work which was entrusted to the chairman of the January session.

Your committee have considered the paragraph of the Warden's address relative to the heating appi-

places in the gaol and other county buildings. Your committee recommended that the chairman be authorized to obtain all requisite information on the question of warming the buildings by a central system of hot water, and to report at the November session of the Council.

Your committee recommended that the gift of a cannon to be placed on the Court House grounds, made through the good offices of Col. Sam Hughes, M.P., be cordially accepted and that the chairman be authorized to have the cannon suitably mounted.

Your committee recommended that the east side of the vault room in the Registry Office be furnished with metallic fittings in keeping with the furnishings which have already been placed.

The chairman has reported having awarded contracts for supplies as follows:

Berth and made body wood for Court House and Gaol, at \$8 1/4 per cord, and bread for gaol at 2 1/2 cents per pound. Your committee recommended that the action of the chairman be approved.

HIGH CONSTABLE.

On motion of Mr. Grant, seconded by Mr. Hawkins, the report of the committee on Appointments to fill the office of High Constable of the County was received and read and adopted as follows:

APPOINTMENTS TO OFFICE.

Gentlemen—Your committee have considered the resignation of the office of High Constable of the County by Mr. Stephen Nevison, and beg to recommend that the same be accepted.

Your committee recommended that Harkis Vincent, Chief Constable of the Town of Lindsay, be appointed to fill the vacancy pro tem. Your committee beg leave to introduce a by-law to give effect to the proposed appointment.

The Council then adjourned till 10:30 Saturday session.

SATURDAY'S SESSION.

The final meeting of the County Council was held on Saturday last at 11 o'clock. Warden Parkin was in the chair and all the members present. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed. Moved by Mr. Tiers, seconded by Mr. Byng, that rule 45 be temporarily suspended to permit the presentation of a petition.—Carried by two-thirds vote.

Mr. Tiers presented the petition and appeal of Wm. H. Graham and five other ratepayers of V. S. E. No. 3, Verulam, Fenelon and Sturgeon Point against the neglect or refusal of the Council of the village of Sturgeon Point to appoint an arbitrator.

On motion of Mr. Tiers, seconded by Mr. Byng, this was referred to the committee on Education.

Moved by Mr. Beatty, seconded by Mr. Lowes, that the Finance and Assessment Committee be instructed to report on the advisability of petitioning the Railway Commission for an order to the Grand Trunk to change its station at Omenee.—Carried.

After an adjournment for five minutes the Council resumed work.

ROADS AND BRIDGES.

On motion of Mr. Graham, seconded by Mr. Campbell, the report of the committee on Roads and Bridges was received. The Council going into committee, with Mr. Campbell in the chair, adopted same with amendments.

Gentlemen—Your committee have considered the paragraphs of the Warden's address referred to them and all relative documents, including the orders of His Honor, Judge Harding, in the matters of the bridges, which under the order have become County bridges, and beg to recommend as follows:

1. That the Ope bridge across the Scuzoy river south of Lindsay, be replaced by a steel and concrete bridge in accordance with the plans and report of the County Engineer and under his supervision, that James A. Hopkins and George A. Jordan, esqs., be a committee with whom the Engineer may consult and advise, and that the Engineer communicate with the Hamilton Bridge Works Company, who are to supply the superstructure, as to the use of corrugated iron in the concrete floor and to ask the Company to submit their plans to A. W. Campbell, esq., Deputy Minister of Public Works, for his approval. The County is to be liable for any expense in and out of the bridge, and the judgment rendered.

2. That the expenditure of \$40.75 in repairing McLaren's Creek bridge, in the township of Fenelon, be approved.

3. That the judgment and order in the matter of the Roseville bridge be authorized, and that the Warden be authorized to have the bridge repaired.

4. That the mill pond bridge in the village of Bobocook be raised, and the whole structure improved, and put in a first class condition, under the supervision and direction of Frederick C. Fielding and Robert A. Callan, esqs.

5. That the Omenee bridge be raised on concrete bases, steel beams substituted for the timber supports, the strings duplicated, the flooring renewed, the stone work repaired and the superstructure repainted under the direction of the County Engineer with the advice and concurrence of Joseph T. Beatty, esq., and the Warden.

Your committee have considered the resolution of Council instructing them to report, and beg to recommend as follows:

1. That the Forest House and North Bridges in the village of Bobcaygeon be repaired under the direction of Geo. Byng, esq.

2. That an additional grant of \$100 be made to the township of Dalton, to assist in completing the rebuilding of Gilbert's bridge. The documents connected with the former grant have been considered.

3. That William Lowes, esq., be authorized to make necessary repairs on Brown's bridge on the boundary between the townships of Ope and Emily.

Your committee have considered the other documents referred to them, and beg to recommend as follows:

1. That the judgment of His Honor Judge Harding on the application respecting the proportions of cost of maintenance and repair of Mud Narrows bridge, in the township of

Council of the Corporation of the Village of Sturgeon Point, although duly petitioned, to appoint an arbitrator in the matter of the alteration of the said school section, and appealing to the County Council against such neglect or refusal, and requesting the County Council to appoint arbitrators in accordance with the provisions of Public Schools Act, 1901. Your Committee have also considered the appeal of two of the trustees of the said school section against the action of the Council of the Village of Sturgeon Point in regard to the boundaries of the school section; a document signed by thirty-five persons who state they are ratepayers of that portion of the school section within the Township of Verulam, and a document signed by fourteen persons who also state they are ratepayers of the same portion of the school section expressing opposition to the division of the school section and the building of two schools. Your Committee recommend that the prayer of the petition and the appeal of the six ratepayers and the trustees be granted, and that Mr. Alexander Dunsmuir, of the Township of Verulam, Mr. John Campbell, of the Township of Fenelon, and Mr. William H. Stevens, Inspector of Schools, be appointed arbitrators. Your Committee beg leave to introduce a by-law to give effect to the recommendation.

Your Committee have read with pleasure the reports made by Alexander Morrison and Samuel Truman, the representatives of the rural school trustees of the County, appointed by the Council of the Township of the Ontario Educational Association in April last, and have been much gratified by the address of Mr. Truman, who appeared before the Committee.

Your Committee beg to express appreciation of the reports and to thank the gentlemen for their attendance at the sessions of the Association.

The Council then adjourned until Tuesday, June 25th, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE.

The report of the Education Committee was received and adopted as follows:

Gentlemen—Your Committee have considered the report of the High School Settlement committee, and beg to recommend as follows:

1. That the amount for which the County should be liable for the maintenance of County pupils at the Lindsay Collegiate Institute for the year 1907 is \$2548.39, being the amount of percentage as shown in the statement submitted by the Board of Education, \$2287.92, and the sum of \$260.47, the share of the net amount it is estimated will be payable by the County that will be constituted by the Town of Lindsay in the County rate, the amount of fees received from County pupils to be deducted in the settlement by the treasurer.

2. That the amount for which the County should be made liable for the maintenance of County pupils at the Omenee High School for the year 1907 is \$644.40, being the amount of percentage as shown in the statement submitted, \$639.26, and the sum of \$5.14, the share of the net amount it is estimated will be payable by the County that will be contributed by the village of Omenee to the County rate, the amount of fees received from County pupils to be deducted in the settlement by the treasurer.

Your Committee have considered the communication from Thomas Stewart, chairman of the Board of Education of the Town of Lindsay, relative to the establishment of an Agricultural Class in the Lindsay Collegiate Institute, and have heard addresses on the subject from E. J. Fox, M. P., G. G. James, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, Mr. Reed, who has been appointed by the Government to take charge of the work, and members of the Board of Education. Your Committee recommend that there be granted to the Board of Education a sum of not less than \$500 for the present year, and a further sum not to exceed \$200, in the present year, all or any payments to be made under the direction of a committee to be composed of Thomas H. Watson, James H. Hopkins and Donald Grant.

Your Committee have read with much interest the reports of the Inspectors of Schools for East and West Victoria, and beg to recommend that the reports be printed in the minutes of Council.

Your Committee beg to recommend that the report of the Victoria Educational Association be filed.

Your Committee beg to recommend that the notice from the High School Board of the Town of Downanville, that the High School is open to pupils from the County of Victoria on the same terms as to pupils from the United Counties of Northumberland and Durham be filed.

Your Committee recommend that accounts as follows be passed, namely: Alex. Morrison, expenses Ontario Educational Association, \$12.80; Wilson & Wilson, forms for Inspectors, \$4; Watchman-Wardner Co., post cards for Inspectors, \$6.75.
