BROTHER KILLED IN MICHIGAN

SAD DISCOVERY OF MR. C. WILSON, FOREMAN FOR RATHBURN CO.

Deceased Was a Shoemaker and Left Fenelon Falls About Fifteen Ago. (From Evening Post, Saturday.) On Monday of last week Mr. G. H. Wilson, publisher of The Post, received a letter from a party in Manistique, Mich., stating that a man named Matt Wilson had been shot at Corinne, in that vicinity, on June 10, and it was believed that relatives resided somewhere in the vicinity of Lindsay. Mr. Wilson handed the letter to Mr. Geo. Wilson, of Fenelon Falls, superintendent of the Rathburn Co's lumbering operations in this district, who happened to be in town that day, and as Mr. Wilson's brother Matt was in that vicinity when last heard from, the worst was feared, and he and Mr. Chris Graney left next day for Corinne, reaching there Wednesday at noon.

They found ample evidence that the victim of the shooting was indeed Mr. Wilson's brother. The body had been embalmed and kept in the hope that relatives might put in an appearance, failing which the funeral had taken place that afternoon. Letters and other documents which had been preserved by friends of deceased proved his identity beyond doubt. Some Lindsay citizens will no doubt remember the unfortunate man, he having learned the trade of shoemaker with the late James Connolly of this town, about eighteen years ago. At all events Mr. Geo. Wilson will have the sympathy of many Lindsay friends owing to his bereavement of a dear brother under such sad circumstances.

Details of the Shooting.

The Manistique Daily News gives the following particulars of the sad event: A fatal case of shooting occurred at Corinne Friday shortly after 6 o'clock. The 8 o'clock train brought the unfortunate victim of the affair to the Manistique hospital, where everything is being done to save his life, but there is little or no hope of his recovery.

It has been the custom of a crowd of young men at Corinne to gather at a shooting place there lives an elderly shoemaker by the name of Thomas Dohen, whom the boys of the village have tormented more or less for some time past. It happened on the evening in question that the shot accidentally slipped and crashed into the door of the old man's home, causing him to appear immediately with a shot gun and an aroused temper. Without warning he fired, and as a result Matt Wilson, a young lumberman, 35 years of age, was fatally wounded. The distance was only 15 feet and the charge must have been buckshot as there were seven holes in his side, damaging the spine so that the limbs were paralyzed.

When the patient arrived at the hospital Dr. Cole had hopes of being able to save him, but by 9 o'clock it was not expected he would live an hour. Life was too nearly extinct to permit of the use of chloroform and efforts to raise his pulse was unavailing. Matt Wilson is unmarried and is known throughout the neighborhood as an industrious fellow. He had planned during the day to leave Corinne on the 8 o'clock train for Manistique, but for some cause failed to carry out his plan.

CUTTING AFFRAY LAST WEEK

DISAGREEMENT BETWEEN TWO BROTHERS-IN-LAW ENDS BADLY.

Victim Received a Knife Wound in the Hip, but Will Recover.

A serious stabbing affray took place June 23, opposite the G. T. R. station about 9.30. Mr. M. Myles, who runs the grocery business in McWilliams' terrace, was the victim. It seems that Mr. J. P. Wells, painter, who is a brother-in-law of Myles, had owed the latter a sum of money for some time past, and had received the bill. He appeared at Mr. Myles' store, the worse of liquor, and denied that he owed any money. Wells loitered about the store, using bad language, and finally Myles gave him a shove, following which Wells struck at Myles with the open blade of a large jack-knife, the point of which was very sharp. The knife entered the right leg below the hip, and made a deep and long gash as it was withdrawn.

Dr. Herriman was called and dressed the wound. He pronounced it to be not dangerous unless blood poisoning set in. Wells was arrested about 10.30 by Constables Reeves and Crawford, and was brought before P. M. Jackson next morning. He was remanded until June 30th.

VICTORIA CO. CHEESE BOARD.

BUYER WHITTON AGAIN THREATENED WITH BANISHMENT

Because he Refused some Bobcaygeon and North Ops Cheese.

Following is a synopsis of the discussion at Tuesday's Cheese Board meeting:

The salesman from Bobcaygeon, rose to his feet and said he thought it was wrong to allow Mr. Whitton to buy cheese on the Board. He referred to Mr. Whitton's purchase of Bobcaygeon cheese at last sale and said he came around and inspected but would not take it at the price he quoted at the previous board meeting.

Mr. Whitton—"When I went to the factory in question I found a number of the cheese open and the flavor bad. I told the cheesemaker to take and cut the boxes down a quarter of an inch and by the time they got to Belleville they would probably close up. If the Bobcaygeon cheese was good I would have had no object in throwing it up. We are allowed to go into the car and see our goods. In regard to the North Ops complaint, there were some ten or twelve cheese the flavour of which was not very good, and as there was only a small quantity of cheese I thought they could get rid of them. When you find some of the cheese with the flavor bad it is altogether likely that you will find that the rest will be the same."

Mr. Flavell—"This is a fitting sequel to that which happened on this board a few weeks ago. If we had bought this cheese we would have been compelled to pay for the cheese. Some security should be demanded by the board." Mr. Whitton then moved that Mr. Whitton be suspended from this Board for the period of one month, and asked, "Is there any seconder?"

Mr. Whitton—"I wish you would do it for the whole term—it would suit me better."

President Robertson—"I know that Mr. Whitton is well able to give instruction along the line of cheesemaking and knows good cheese, but I want you to be careful about voting anybody off this Board—I would rather that the buyers would pay for the cheese in Lindsay, as there would then be no more such trouble."

Mr. Whitton—"I know that Bobcaygeon is a good factory, but the best of these factories will sometimes get astray once in awhile, and I defy any person to say that the cheese which I did not take were satisfactory. I asked the cheesemaker if the boxes were a fair sample of what the rest of the boxes contained, and he said they were."

Mr. Parkins—"I was not here at the last meeting of the Board and I guess I missed a lot of fun. (Laughter). If I remember aright, did not this Board appoint arbitrators who were to settle all disputes between the buyer and seller. Why don't they do it?"

Mr. Whitton—"I would like anybody to say the cheese which I rejected were good. I will call on Mr. Publow to inspect them, and if he says they are good I will take them."

Mr. Brown—"You are a director over Mr. Publow, and—"

Mr. Whitton—"No, I have nothing to do with Mr. Publow."

Mr. Brown—"You are a director in the Association, but have nothing to do with Mr. Publow."

Mr. Flavell—"What I object to is this—At the last meeting of this Board, Mr. Whitton compelled me to pay more than I wanted to; he compels us to take cheese that he would not take himself."

Mr. Whitton—"I had my orders to pay \$1.00."

Mr. Flavell—"If the buyers would put up a security we would then have peace on the Board."

Mr. Whitton—"I was talking to Mr. Hill on Saturday, and he said the cheese in question were a good lot excepting the ten or twelve."

Mr. Brown—"I have taken cheese which Mr. Whitton said I should have. I think Mr. Hill knows something about cheese."

Mr. Flavell—"Were the North Ops cheese really the worse for bad flavor?"

Mr. Whitton—"Yes, it looked to me as if the milk was too fresh from the cows."

Mr. Currin—"I move we get our cheese paid for in Lindsay."

Mr. Staples—"I am not in this row but if we force these buyers to bring \$1000 as a security it will stop some other good men from coming to this board. I would suggest that if we put any punishment on buyers I think we should put it on the one man at fault, and not on the rest. I move that when a man does wrong, we punish that man individually."

Mr. Cook—"I am not going to spend the time of coming to Lindsay twice a week. I'll quit."

Mr. Staples—"I think the cheese should be paid for before it is sent; we are not responsible for our cheese after shipping them in good order."

Mr. Whitton—"We don't hear a word of this in other factories; from Kingston, east every cheese is bought and guaranteed. There's no cheese inspected for quality that has got to be guaranteed in Montreal. The more you tie up the buyer's hands in the west, the more you have got to get away from the prices. We never hear of cash on delivery at other factories."

Mr. Robertson—"Mr. Wrighton, of Peterboro, will not come here on account of the prices."

Mr. Cook—"You may count me out as far as the \$100 is concerned."

Mr. Whitton—"Me too."

Mr. Robertson—"If we send our cheese out of Lindsay to be inspected let us send it to the Old Country."

Mr. Parkins—"I feel as perfectly safe in sending to Montreal as I do selling to any town buyers."

Mr. Whitton—"Whether you believe me or not, I have explained this matter squarely—we wanted fair stuff."

Mr. Staples tried to explain matters, but was interrupted by Mr. Whitton with the remark, "You are jumping at conclusions that have never happened."

Mr. Staples—"If I were Bobcaygeon I would sue the buyer for the value if I had proper grounds."

Then the bidding followed. Mr. Flavell's motion to expel Mr. Whitton, being dropped. Cameron and Cambry refused to sell to Mr. Cook unless he would pay in Lindsay. Pine Grove refused to sell to Mr. Whitton. The next meeting of the board will likely be in two weeks' time.
