ESCAPED DEATH BY MIRACLE

LINDSAY BOY'S HANDS MANCLED BY C. T. R. TRAIN LAST WEEK

It is supposed that Victim Fell Asleep Alongside the Track.
(From Evening Post, June 23.)
Fred Carlin, a young man about 22 years of age, son of Mr. M. Carlin, east ward, was manacled for last night, and had an exceedingly narrow escape from death, as a result of excessive indulgence in liquor.

The unfortunate young fellow, who is known and liked by almost everyone owing to his happy disposition and skill as a step-dancer, has been employed in the cookery of the L. B. & P. R.'s construction train, now stationed at Ward's farm. Near Ottawa bridge, for the past two weeks, and came into town last night to see his friends. It was almost twelve o'clock when he left to return to the camp by way of the G. T. R. bridge.

About 12:30 a Grand Trunk double-header train in charge of Conductor Henden and Drivers Tuiten and Lytle pulled out of Lindsay yard for Belleville, and some time after it had passed Carlin made his appearance at the C. P. R. camp in a pitiable condition, and aroused the men by his calls for aid. Both of his hands were horribly manacled, and blood was pouring from his nostrils. Luckily steam had not gone down in the locomotive, and Conductor Jas. Bost and the engine man brought Carlin to the King-st. crossing and from that point assisted him to Dr. Shier's office, where morphine was administered to ease his pain. A hack was then secured and Carlin was conveyed to Ross Hospital where Drs. Shier and Gillespie amputated several of the fingers of both hands and sewed up the wounds. The medical men are not overly sanguine.

It is supposed that the unfortunate fellow stumbled on his way to camp and, overcome by the "quor he had taken, fell asleep with his hands on the rail. His punishment is severe, yet he has cause to be thankful that he was not ground to pieces under the heavy train.

VICTORIA COUNTY COUNCIL

THE REGULAR JUNE SESSION OPENED TUESDAY OF LAST WEEK

Not Much Business to be Dealt With by the Members.
(Continued from last week.)

On motion of Mr. Scully, seconded by Mr. Bryans, the report of the standing committee on printing was received, read and adopted.

Report of Equalization Committee. On motion of Messrs. McGee and Bailey, the report of the Equalization committee was read and adopted. A by-law in connection therewith was also passed as follows:

Gentlemen,—Your committee beg to recommend that the equalized values of all the municipalities in the County be the same as in the year of 1903.

Your committee beg further to recommend that the annexed schedule containing the municipal statistics of the local municipalities for the year 1903, and the equalized values for the purposes of the year 1904, be made a part of this report.

Your committee beg leave to introduce a by-law to give effect to the recommendation as to the equalized values.
On motion of Mr. Bryans, seconded by Mr. Graham, Council adjourned until 10 o'clock to-morrow.

FRIDAY'S SESSION.

Council resumed business this morning, with all members present except Mr. McQuade, the Warden in the chair. The minutes of Thursday's proceedings were read and approved. The following documents were submitted:

Report of the County Plowman's Association, and request for grant.
From the Treasurer of Somerville, respecting that of Hall for County Police Magistrate's court.
On motion the documents were referred to appropriate committees.

Report of Education Committee.
On motion of Mr. Staback, seconded by Mr. Fairbairn, the report of the Education committee was received and adopted as follows:

Gentlemen,—Your committee have considered the report of the High School Settlement Committee, and beg to express approval of the same, and to recommend that the report be re-introduced to the Council.

Your committee have read and considered the reports of the inspectors of Schools for East and West Victoria, and beg to recommend that the reports be printed in the minutes.

Your committee have considered the resolution of Council which proposes that a grant be made to assist in rebuilding the High and Public School at Oremee. The building about to be erected will be used for both High and Public School purposes. As the statutory provision enables County Councils to give additional aid to High Schools or Collegiate Institutes only the Public School must be dissociated. A deputation from the Board of Education appeared, and supported the proposal on the ground of the great loss sustained by the High School district by reason of the aborning of the school building. Your committee beg to recommend that the sum of five hundred dollars be granted to the Board of Education to be expended in providing equipment and facilities for High School purposes, the amount to be paid on the order of the members for the Third County Council Division.

Your committee have examined accounts as follows, and beg to recommend that the same be passed, viz:
Wilson & Wilson, printing for Inspectors..... \$14.00
Hart & Riddell, stationery for Inspectors..... 15.40

Your committee have examined the financial reports of the Lindsay Collegiate Institute and the Oremee High School for the year 1903, and submit summaries of same.
On motion of Messrs. Austin and Shaver, Mr. W. H. Stevens, Inspector of Schools for West Victoria, addressed the Council respecting the needs of the Ragged Rapids school section in the Township of Dalton, and the bad ventilation in many of the schools.

Moved by Messrs. Graham and Bryans, that the Education committee report on the advisability of making a special grant to E. S. No. 5, in the Township of Dalton.—Carried.
Second Education Report.
On motion of Messrs. Staback and McGee, the report of the committee appointed at the January session with power and authority to settle with the boards of Education of the Town of Lindsay and the Village of Oremee, respectively, the amounts to be paid for the maintenance of County pupils, was again received and was adopted as follows:

Gentlemen.—A meeting was held at the Court House on May 18th, 1904. There were present the members of your Committee, viz: James Graham, Frederick Shaver, John W. Wood, M. D., and Adam N. Staback, esquires, and the Warden, William Charbon, esquire, and on behalf of the Board of Education of the Town of Lindsay: Thomas Stewart, esquire, chairman of the Finance Committee; John Carow and F. Blanchard, M. D., esquires; and J. C. Hartstone, esquire, Principal of the Collegiate Institute.

The Board of Education of the Village of Oremee, was not represented. A. E. Staback, esq., was appointed chairman.
It was agreed that the method adopted in 1903 to make a settlement for one year only should be followed, the course evidently contemplated by the High Schools Act.

The average attendance of County pupils to the total attendance for the years 1901, 1902 and 1903, was 33.2 per cent.
The percentage of County rates paid by the Town of Lindsay is 13.11. It was again contended, on behalf of the Board of Education, as was done at former conferences, that while there is no provision to the effect in the High Schools Act, the Board of Education should in addition

committee to report at the next session of the Council.
Your committee have given further consideration to the proposed grant for the repair of Mud Lake Narrows bridge, in the Township of Cardon, deferred from the January session. The question has since taken a wider aspect in view of the contention by the Reeve of the municipality that the bridge is within the provisions of Section 617a of the Consolidated Municipal Act, 1903. Your committee recommend, therefore, that a special committee be appointed, composed of John W. Wood, M. D., and John Bailey, esq., and the Warden, to inspect the bridge and enquire into surrounding conditions, and report at the next session of the Council.

Your Committee have examined the minutes of a joint meeting held at the Pigeon Creek floating bridge on May 12th last, at which Charles Fairbairn and T. H. McQuade, esq., were present on behalf of the County of Victoria. Your Committee beg to express approval of the proposed repairs, and to recommend that Mr. Fairbairn be authorized to act for the County in connection with the completion of the work, and to give directions to the treasurer for the payment of the share of expenditure for which accounts have not yet been rendered.

The regular meeting of the Peterboro Cheese Board was held June 22nd in the Council chamber, the President in the chair, and the following buyers present: Messrs. Kerr, Fitzgerald, Cook, Whittow, Rollins, Wrighton, Gilchrist, Grant and McLean. Forty-one factories boarded.

The bidding was started by Mr. Kerr at 7 1/4. Mr. Fitzgerald raised to 7 1/2. Mr. Whittow made it 7 3/4 and Mr. Fitzgerald again raised to 7 3/4, and called the following: Keene, Central Smith, Westwood, Villiers, Fraserville, Myrtle, Buckhorn, East Emily, all excepting except Central Smith and Lindsays.
Mr. Whittow offered 7 3/4, and called the following: Melrose Abbey, Ormiston, Indian River, Perry, Beckley, Norwood, Shearer, Sluazreck, Dartford, Cavanville, Mount Pleasant, Bensford, all accepting.
Mr. Rollins, at 7 3/4 called the following, who accepted: North Smith, Warrimster, Pine Grove, Maple Leaf, Young's Point, North Danmor, Stony Lake and South Burleigh.
Mr. Cook offered 7 3/4, and called the following: Missing Link and Lang, who refused.
Mr. Fitzgerald called as follows for 7 11-16: Central Smith and Oremee, but they refused.
