The road work is superintended by commissioners appointed by the Council. We find that we get more work, and better work, done than under statute labor. The work is done at the right time, and the roads are kept open in winter. Men are appointed in each district to picw out the roads after every storm, and travellers going through the township are never delayed. Common plows attached to the side of the bobof this work is 25 cents an hour for man and team. It takes four hours tive-mile route. Very little shovelling is necessary, as the road is never allowed to block up.
