### FOOT MANGLED BY TRAIN

#### FOOLHARDY ACT OF A YOUNG MAN RESULTS IN SERIOUS INJURY.

Was Attempting to Board C. P. R. Ballast Train and Fell Between Cars and Station Platform.

Many citizens who were inspecting the new C. P. R. station in the east ward Sunday afternoon were horrified witnesses to an accident that was at first believed to be fatal.

While a number of people were standing on the station platform the ballast train of 22 loaded cars and an engine backed around the curve from the south, at a speed of about 15 miles an hour. The van was on the front end, and Conductor Bards stood on top signalling to the engine. As the van passed a young man named Jas. Hartley, about 19 years of age attempted to board the car, but missed his hold of the grab iron and dropped between the moving cars and the platform. The mishap was not noticed by the conductor, and the engine had not come into view across the corner of Callan's house. Women shrieked and a loud strong man turned pale in expectation of a terrible fatality, which would probably have occurred but for the presence of mind of John Goslin who leaped down to help Hartley who had fallen in such a way that in the narrow space his feet were in danger of being run over by every passing wheel. A few moments later Goslin received aid from another man, and by this time the engineer had noticed the commotion and stopped the train. Hartley was then lifted onto the station platform, where he was attended by Dr. Keith, of Omemee who was present. The right foot was found to be badly mangled, and in addition the poor fellow had received a number of contusions and cuts. He was taken to the Ross Hospital at about 5.30 o'clock, and the injured foot was amputated at the ankle during the evening. The patient survived the shock well, and his condition at present is satisfactory.

The injured young man is a son of Mr. Thos. Hartley, fireman on Flavelles Limited cold storage warehouse, where he also was employed. It is generally believed that if he had not been helped by Mr. Goslin he would have been drawn under the cars and cut to pieces.

### SAWMILL WRECKED

#### Fatality Near Haliburton Tuesday Morning.

#### TWO MEN KILLED AND OTHERS SERIOUSLY INJURED.

The Boiler Exploded and the Mill was Razed by the Shock.

(Special to The Post.)

Haliburton, July 5th, 3 p. m. —Shortly after 7 o'clock this morning the large boiler used in Messrs. Paters & Cain's saw mill, located seven miles from this village, exploded, completely demolishing the mill and instantly killing Wm. Duncan, a young man employed on the premises, Wm. Wynn, who was also injured, lived until about 2.30 o'clock. Several others were more or less injured by falling timbers and scalded by steam.

The loss will be considerable, as the mill is a complete wreck, and will reach \$5,000 or \$6,000, besides putting the firm out of business for this year.

### CAN STOP A GREAT EVIL.

#### PHYSICIAN ASKED NOT TO ISSUE ORDERS FOR LIQUOR.

License Department Requests Medical Men not to Grant Permits Indiscriminately.

The indiscriminate manner in which medical men in various parts of the province issue orders to liquor dealers authorizing them to sell liquor to persons who would not otherwise be able to obtain it, has caused the Provincial License Department a great deal of concern. Of late the evil seemed to have become aggravated and with a view to preventing, or at least minimizing it, Mr. Eudo Saunders, chief officer of the department, on Wednesday sent the following letter to Dr. R. A. Pyne, M. P., registrar of the Ontario Medical Council:

"The Provincial License Department has recently received a number of complaints from various parts of the province that medical practitioners in the districts in question are in the habit of giving prescriptions or orders to hotel keepers and shop licensees to supply liquor to the holders of the orders, sometimes for indefinite periods, and often in absurdly large quantities, and it was thought probable that the Medical Council might see fit, if attention were called to the matter, to make an effort to minimize this evil.

"The department would prefer not to give any names for publication, but it should be prejudicial to the practice of the profession without being correspondingly beneficial to the public. I may, however, say that within the last few days three complaints have been received of this character. In one instance thirty orders had been given within ten days in a small place mostly to persons to have reached an acute stage on two successive Sundays.
