

TWO MEN KILLED AND OTHERS SERIOUSLY INJURED.

The Boiler Exploded and the Mill was Razed by the Shock.

Haliburton, July 5th, 3 p. m. -Shortly after 7 o'clock this morning the large boiler used in Messrs. Paters & Cain's saw mill, located seven miles from this village, exploded, completely demoishing the mill and instantly killing Wm. Duncan, a young man employed on the premises, Wm. Wynn, who was also njured, lived until about 2.50 o'clock. Several others were more or less injured by falling timbers and scalded

The loss will be considerable, as the mill is a complete wreck, and will reach \$5,000 or \$6,000, besides putting the firm out of business for this

PHYSICIAN ASKED NOT TO ISSUE ORDERS FOR LIQUOR.

License Department Requests Medical Men not to Grant Permits Indis. criminately.

The indiscriminate manner in which medical men in various parts of the province issue orders to liquor dealers authorizing them to sell liquor to persons who would not otherwise be able to obtain it, has caused the Provincial License Department great deal of concern. "The department would prefer not to give any names for publication lest it should be prejudicial to the practitioners without being correspondingly beneficial to the public. I may, however, say that within the last few days three complaints have one instance thirty orders had been given within ten days in a small place mostly to persons to have others. reached an acute stage on two successive Sundays.
