STEAMER ACROUND AT NO. 5 LOCK City of Peterborough Met With a Slight

Accident. Examiner. Friday: 'The 'City of Peterboro" this morning left Peterbero for an excursion to Burleigh Falls, over the lift lock and through the canal to Lakefield. This is the first trip of this steamer up the canal, and while on the way to Lakefield she met with a slight mish p. which delayed her for some little time. All went well until the big steamer reached a point just below No 5 lock, where in a rock cut about 60 feet wide the prow of the steamer run aground, and up on the side of the cut. This occurred just about 100 yards south of the lock, and the steam : was fast aground for about an hour and a quarter, when she released herself and proceeded on her way. It was found that no serious injuries had been sustained by the steamer grounding and no leaks were discovered.
