For Murder of an Infant. Chesley, July 9.—The coroner's jury Saturday brought in a verdict that the infant found on the railway track came by its death by being thrown from a moving train, and the suspicion pointed strongly to Maggie Murphy. Her preliminary trial took place yesterday afternoon. She was committed for trial and taken to Walkerton jail.

Turks Fight Bulgarians. Salonica, July 10.—In the Konia district yesterday, Turkish troops annihilated three Bulgarian bands, which had concentrated, killing 82 of them. The Turks lost 20 killed.

Cotton Spinners Strike. Montreal, July 6.—The cotton mill at Magog closed again. After a meeting the men Wednesday to the number of 400 walked out. The strikers demand an increase of 20 per cent. in wages, recognition of the union, and that all agreements signed be null. The company consider these demands excessive and will resist them.

Service at St. Paul's. London, July 6.—At request of Lord Strathcona, a memorial service for the Canadian victims of the Salsbury wreck will be held at St. Paul's on Tuesday.
