

THE FAILURE OF WHITNEY.

The Whitney Government has been tried and found wanting. Their bare-faced though radical introduction of the spoils system is more and more diagusting even their friends. They have cast their promises and principles to the winds. They denounced the scale of expenditure of the previous government, but have greatly and unwarrantly increased them, largely to provide fat salaries for their relations and friends.

The ludicrous fiasco of Col. Matheson in connection with T. & N. O. bonds thoroughly opened the eyes of public. It is generally recognized, even in his own party, that Col. Matheson is the most incompetent Provincial Treasurer we have seen since Confederation. The injury he has already done to the credit of the Province is very serious indeed, and the effects of his gross mismanagement will be felt for years to come. The best that can be said for him is that he sticks to his friends and tries to provide for them-but always at the public expense. He has shown himself a Tammany Boss of the type of the Yankee politician who said, "Them's my principles; if they don't please you I'll change

principle and pernicious in practice. at add and ill considered; It is especially in their New Onterio Policy that the Whiney Government has been a deplorable and disastrous failure. So signal this failure been that from the Ottawa River to the Winnipes River there is serious talk of seccession and of the formation of a new Province. In this contection it must be borne in mind that the mismanagement, misgovernment and maladmistration of a Tory Government at Ottawa drove part of the Northwest Territories into rebellion and inflicted losses on the country from which the West did not recover until after the vigorpus and progressive policy of the Laurier Government in 1896.

The exorbitant and oppressive exactions of the Ontario Government commission bleed the struggling settlers and pioneers and retard progress and development. In their administration of New Ontario the Whitney Government are obviously dominated by what the Toronto Globe aptly described as the "vulpine intelligence" of R. R. Gamey. The virtuous declarations of Premier Whitney and his solemn promise

to the farmers were alike cast to the winds when they came into conflict with the clamant demand of the notorious member for Manitoulin for a fat subsidy for the Manitoulin and North Shore Railway. The fatuous mining policy of the Whitney Government and much of

their legislation are on a close scrutiny seen to be ingeniously designed in the interests of the Standard Oil Company and kindred monopolies, which, it is now clear, control the Whitney Government. In New Ontario the Whitney Government act on the principle that no Canadian need apply unless backed by foreign financial magnates. The rights of pioneers and mere Canadiana are ruthlessly attacked and relentlessly taken away, but when they deal with the Standard Oil Company and its various ramifications the Whitney Government deal much more tenderly. This is apparent when one refers to what are known as the Earl cases. These were commenced by the Government with a great flourish of trumpets, but nothing more will be done than is necessary to enable certain Tory lawyers to earn fat fees. When the Government understood they were ditatking the Standard Oil interests they roured as mildly as any sucking dove. When attacking Canadian students, farmers and New Ontario pioneers the Whitney Government are, as previously pointed out, relentless and ruthless, especially if they have something which friends of the Government want. To appear consistent the Government were compelled to make a pretence of suing writs against the Standard Oil crowd, who have acquired immense areas of the riches silver lands in the heart of the silver district, but it is already apparent that these cases are not being seriously pressed, and it may be safely predicted that by some dodge or by taking advantage of some trivial technicality they will be quietly dropped as soon as the Government think the public have sufficiently forgotten the facts to overlook their manoeuvre,

The complaints against the exactions of the autocratic Whitney Government are widespread and unceasing. It would be different if these exections were, spent for useful public services, but when it is known that they are used largely for the purpose of providing fat salaries for relatives and friends of the members of the Government the feelings of discontent which we hear from all parts of New Ontario are greatly ag-

At first it was thought that with experience the Government would gravated. improve, but the contrary is found to be the case; and more and more it is seen that Mr. Whitney and his colleagues are becoming more and more arrogant and autocratic. The maintrouble seems to be that they consider themselves the owners of the Province and its resources instead of being, as they should be, the servants of the people and the trustees of the Province for the proper and efficient management and administration of its affairs.


