

Has Now Been Arrested. Buffalo, July 16 .- Because he would not deliver to two burglars the keys of his employer's house, Frank Smith, 45 years old, a coachman in the employ of John Gehm, a wholesale meat dealer, was horribly tortured Sunday morning and left for dead by his as-

Smith slept in a room above the barn at the rear of Gehm's house. He was awakened shortly after midnight by two masked men, who demanded the keys of the house. Smith refused to give them up and the burglars then began a series of revolting tortures. Smith's tongue was slit with a knife and the soles of his feet were slashed in a score of places until he became unconscious. The man then threw Smith down the stairs, where he was found the next morning.

The matter was kept a secret by the police until yesterday, when one arrest was made. The prisoner gives his name as Taylor.

Adverse Resolutions.

Will Adhere to Existing Agreement-Miners Are Determined to Hold Out -Managers Claim Can Get Plenty of Labor. Scale Asked For-Western Federation the Real

Cause of the Whole Trouble. Cobalt, July 15 .- A prolonged strike is evidently in store for Cobalt, though several mine managers declare they will be able to bring in all the labor they require.

The committee of the Miners' Union was prepared to modify their schedule of daily wages as follows: Carpenters \$3.50, carpenters' helpers \$2.75, mechanics \$3.50, pipe fitters \$3, blacksmiths \$3.75, helpers \$3, engineers 321-2 cents an hour, firemen 271-2 cents per hour, ore sorters \$3, hammermen \$3, teamsters \$2.50, hoistmen \$2.75, cage or buckers \$3, surface laborers \$2.50. underground labor and cage or bucketers \$2.75, machine helpers \$3, machine men and timber-

The union also asked for a ninehour shift all round, and not more than 60 cents per day for board. The above scale was prepared by the union committee and is said to have been ratified by a mass meeting of union men, but this cannot be confirmed. However, the six union and non-union men on the miners' committee were prepared to recommend

the above scale. Managers' Statement. The mine managers handed out the following statement: "At a meeting of the representatives of the undersigned mines, in session, the following re-

solution was adopted unanimously: "That this body of mine managers and superintendents firmly believe that the schedule of wages offered to the employes of the Cobalt mines is eminently just and fair, and is higher than any other wage scale at present in force in Ontario, unanimously adhere to the agreement and scale of wages and hours published by themselves, and that no deviation be made from the same."

Want to Fight Now. The fact that the Cobalt union is a branch of the Western Federation is the cause of the trouble. The mine managers believe a struggle with this body has to come, and the sooner the better. Some mine managers who have been engaged in prior contests with this federation have strongly impressed this feeling among other managers and to-day some Canadian managers of small companies are believed to have fallen in line rather out of a dislike to fight with other managers than from a dislike to the proposed schedule. Some, however, of the superintendents of small companies are as emphatic as any in their determination to give no increase.

The mine managers are now busy preparing scales, which, they will be uniform, and claim that the union has taken the maximum paid cular class of labor and used it as the minimum in their schedule.
