## A Lindsayite Falls to His Death | 65,615,025

EDWARD BUSH INSTANTLY KILLED AT PORT SANDFIELD.

Attempted to Jump to Swinging Bridge -Miscalculated the Distance and Fell Thirty Feet to Wharf Below.

Many Lindsay citizens will regret to hear of the sudden death of Mr. Edward Bush, of this town, which occurred at Port Sandfield, Muskoks, a few miles from Bracebridge, Monday afternoon, as the result of an accident. Mr. Bush, together with Mr. Ancil Mills, were engaged on some construction work for the Ontario Public Works Department at that point. The bridge at the cut at Port Sandfield was being awung to allow the Str. Islander to pass through, when Mr. Bush, who was standing on the approach, attempted to jump across to the bridge after it had been swung a few feet. He evidently miscalculated the distance, struck the railing, and fell to the wharf below, a distance of thirty feet, alighting on his head. Death was instan-

The deceased came to Lindsay from Whitby some 27 years ago, and for o er welve years had been connected with the Ontario Public Works under the supervision of Mr. Thos. Walters. He was comparatively a young man, being only in his 48th year. He was a man of fine physique and weighed over 200 pounds. Mr. Bush was considered to be one of the best workmen in the service, and was respected by all who were ac-

In addition to this there are leading articles by Canadian and American authors on subjects relating to the home, care and furnishing of the house, care of children, treatment of servants, housekeeping as a profession, housekeeping in the country, te. Mrs. Martha Van Rennselaer, of Cornell University, contributes an article on "Saving St ps," which contains many useful hints in reference to economizing time and mone in the home. "How to Build the Farm Home," is di-cuissed at length, and illustrations of convenient farm houses are given, together with the plan of construction, cost of materisl, etc. "A Simple Method of Disposing of House Sewage on the Farm,' has been written by an officer in the Department of Public Works, Ontar'o. This most important topic is given the scope it deserves, and plans are shown for cheap and convenient methods of disposing of

wreat rorgeries at Warsaw. London, Aug. 13 .- A despatch The Daily Mail from St. Petersburg

Winnipeg Free Press Estimate of Northwest Wheat Yield.

ANOTHER MAKES IT 55,000,000

Latter, Mowever, is Only for the Province of Manitoba - With the Territories Thrown In There Will Likely lie Even Mere Than Free Press Claims-Mr. Golden's Facts

Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 8 .- J. J. Golden, Provincial Government 1mmigration Agent, who has been traveling over Manitoba to a considerable extent, estimates this season's wheat yield at . 55 million bushels. This estimate is for Manitoba only and is arrived at on a basis of an average yield of 27 bushels to the

In the territories he thinks there will be fully one third increase over last year in the output.

In the Manitoba wheat field, wheat is growing much thicker this year than last and the number of straws to the square foot is almost double that of last year. The plants have headed out well and every head is fall to the tip. The increase acreage under cultivation will also tend to increase the total output.

Mr. Golden looks for an increase in the other grains also and thinks yield of oats, rye and barley will average fully half as much again than last year.

The Free Press will print to-day its annual crop edition for the current season. Its statistical table gives the probable crop of wheat in Manitoba and the Territories as 65,-615,925 bushels, an increase of 3, 000,000 bushels over the figures of last year.

THE COTTAGE SYSTEM.

Prisoners' Aid Association Wants Youthful Misdemeanants Classified.

Toronto, Aug. 8 .- A deputation from the Prisoner Aid Association waited upon the Provincial Government Thursday afternoon with view of urging upon them the advisability of the greatest care being taken in the classification of boys in connection with the new reformatory to be erected to replace the one at Penetang. The members of the Government in attendance were: Hon. Richard Harcourt, acting Premier Hon. J. R. Stratton, Provincial Secretary, and Hon. John Dryden, Minister of Agriculture. Those on the deputation included: Dr. Rosebrough, secretary of the association; Hamilton Cassells, James Massey, Hugh McMath, Warden Gilmour, Rev. Robert Hall and Finlay Spencer.

With the exception of James Massey, the deputation expressed their appreciation of the cottage plan in the matter of the accommodation for the boy prisoners, instead of the dormitory system at present in vogue. On behalf of the Government, Hon, Mr. Harcourt thanked the deputation for the information given, assuring them that it would be seriously considered in completing the plans for

the proposed institution. It is not decided yet where the Institution is to be located.

WOE IN PATAGONIA, Welsh Seitlers Are Taking to the Hills

Because of Floods, Ottawa, Aug. 8 .- W. L. Griffith, Canadian Government agent in Wales has just returned from a visit to the Welsh Patagonian settlement at Saltcoats, N.W.T. When he arrived here he found a letter awaiting him from the Argentine Republic showing a sad state of affairs existing in the Welsh colony in Patagonia. The Chubit Valley is again flooded. The melting snows in the Andes, together with an unusually heavy rainfall, have created an overflow in the river, which has caused the capital of the colony, Rawson, to be flooded, and the towns of Trelew and Gaiman are under water, and the poor people are flying to the hills for shelter and safety. There is a scarcity of the first necessaries of life and altogether the condition of the people is deplorable. The disposition of those remaining in the colony will no doubt be to follow their friends to Canada, but it is feared they will be, on account of the floods, in a more or less destitute condition and will require assistance. If Canada cannot assist no doubt South Africa will get these

Judges of Live Stock. Toronto, Aug. 13 .- The idea of the Department of Agriculture to furnish judges for the live stock at the different agricultural fairs throughout the province promises to be j-roductive of good results, inasmuch as fifty-eight agricultural societies have taken advantage of the offer. The fairs have been arranged in circuits of from two to three weeks and three fear foul play. judges will visit each fair. Before starting out on their circuits the judges will take a course of training at the Toronto Exhibition. In making their awards they will be supposed to give their reasons, in order that the exhibitor may be thorough-

ly satisfied with the decisions.


