Chief Analyst's Report Submitted to Department of Agriculture. Ottawa, July 29.—When the Hon. Sydney Fisher asked his department to investigate and report upon the sanitary condition of the canned meat industries and slaughter houses of Canada, he at the same time arranged with the Minister of Inland Revenue to have an analysis made of canned meats as offered for sale throughout the Dominion.

As the number of samples put up by manufacturers in the United States, the latter were, of course, obtained from dealers in Canada, but as regards Canadian products, they were taken not only from retail and wholesale merchants but also at the factories. The samples were obtained as follows:—

PRICES SOARED HIGH AT THIS MORNING'S SALE.

First Selection Went at 11 11-160 Second 11 3-40—1600 Boxes Boarded.

Matters took an interesting turn at last Monday's meeting of the Lindsay Cheese Board, when two prices were given for cheese. The bidding commenced at 11c, which offer was made by Buyer Gillespie. Mr. Brown raised it a 1-4 and Mr. Flavalle to the 1-2. Mr. Cook, a new buyer hailing from Belleville, then bid 11 5-8c, and Mr. Gillespie went 11 11-16c, securing the call as follows: Star, Dunsford, North Ops, Maple Leaf, Omemece, Mariposa.

The buyers were getting anxious whether they were going to get any cheese at all and as soon as Mr. Gillespie said "through," there was an explosive of voices, "11 11-16c," from Buyers Cook, Brown and Flavalle. The question was, Who called first? President Robertson thought Mr. Cook had but Mr. Brown maintained that he had called first, while Mr. Flavalle said he had called the same figure.

President Robertson didn't know what to do, and none of the buyers felt like straining a point, so a small deadlock ensued. Now was the time for the buyers to use any reserve force, but Mr. Flavalle came to the rescue by calling 11 3-4c, and buyers who had sold to Mr. Gillespie looked wicker, while the rest showed signs of jubilation. Mr. Flavalle called Bobcaygeon, Reaboro, Palestine and North Harvey and offered 11 11-16c, for further, but Mr. Brown called the 3-4c, and secured the balance of the Board, Cameron, Cambridge, North Verulam.

FOLLOWING OFFERED CHEESE. The factories boarding were as follows: Cameron 114, Dunsford 130, Mariposa 130, Cambridge 79, Omemece 150, North Verulam 125, North Ops 100, Reaboro 155, Bobcaygeon 122, Maple Leaf 122, Palestine 79, Red Rock 160, North Harvey 74, 1600

A short discussion took place re the instructor's fees. Mr. Staples thought that the Board had nothing to do with the fees, but that it rested with the factories to settle it. Buyer Kerr thought the best way would be for the factories to pay into the treasurer of the Board through their salesmen and forward the fees in bulk.

President Robertson explained that they were unwilling to ship cheese the next day after a sale. The President also read a letter asking the Lindsay Board to send a couple of delegates to the Government Cheese Congress at Brockville on Aug. 17th, but none were appointed. The Board then adjourned for two weeks.

4760 BOXES OFFERED AT PETERBORO AND ALL SOLD.

Prices Ranged From 11 5-8 to 11 11-16—Buyers Anxious to Secure Cheese.

Peterboro Examiner: The sale at the meeting of the Peterboro Cheese Board Wednesday morning was a record, in point of the number of cheese boarded, 4760 being offered for sale and all were sold. This constitutes a record for the season.

The price too, was satisfactory to the majority of the salesmen. The bidding took rather an unique form, however. For the first selections the lowest price of the day, 11 5-8c, was obtained, while for later selections the price jumped to 11 11-16c. The feature of the board meeting was the fact that Mr. Morton secured over 2400 boxes, more than half the whole number boarded.

The buyers present were: Messrs. Cook, Kerr, Gillespie, Squires, Whitton, Brentnell, Brenton, Grant, Warrington, Wright and Morton. The bidding started at 11c, which figure Mr. Whitton offered. The other bids were 11 1-8c, Squires; 11 1-4c, Wrighton; 11 5-16c, Whitton; 11 3-8c, Wrighton; 11 1-2c, Squires; 11 9-16c, Wrighton; 11 5-8, Gillespie.

At 5-8c, Mr. Gillespie called Keene, Central Smith, Westwood, Villiers, Buckhorn, Fleetwood, all accepting.

Mr. Brentnell bid 11 11-16c, and called Shearer, Myrtle, Lakelield, Lang, all accepting.

Mr. Morton at the same price called East Emily, Bensford, Trevern, Mount Pleasant, Caranville, Crown, Brickley, Shamrock, all accepting.

At the same price Mr. Squires took Norwood, Melrose Abbey, Ormonde, Okeloid, all accepting.

Mr. Morton at 11 5-8c, took Warsaw, Warminsler, Peterboro, Indian River, Selwyn, Young's Point, Maple Leaf, Pine Grove, Cedardale, South Burleigh.

Mr. Cook at 11 5-8c, called Perrytown, North Dammer, clearing the board.

Perrytown boarded for the first time this season on Wednesday.
