## RAILWAY DECISIONS ON HEELS OF MUTINY

Ontario Board Sustains the London Company.

### AWARD FOR TORONTO CO.

London Company Had the Right to Dismiss its Employees, But the Men Had the Right to Join the Union—Toronto Men Should Be Reinstated Say the Arbitrators—The Finding Was Unanimous.

London, Aug. 3.—(2.35 a. m.)—The Ontario Railway Commission concluded its investigation into the street car strike yesterday and found that the company was justified in its course.

Chairman Leitch, after a few moments' conference with his colleagues, delivered the finding, in part as follows: "It is clear that the real difficulty and cause of the strike was the dismissal of three men, Stewart Buchanan and Aitchison.

"Both the company and the men have rights which have to be respected. The union has a perfect right to form a union and Mr. King had no right to terrorize the men, which will not be tolerated in any civilized country. We don't think the company had any cause for alarm in the formation of a union.

"As to the dismissal of the three employees, the evidence before us certainly cannot ask for their reinstatement. It would indeed be a serious matter for a board to interfere with a company's right to dismiss or employ whom it pleases.

"The company has a right to treat with the men as a union or not as they see fit, but the fact that the men go on a sympathetic strike, as this seems to be, should of course not be a black mark against them.

"We urge upon the company to use tact and judgment, and upon the men to join with the company in doing the best they can for the public service.

"The mayor asked the board to mediate and we think the men might have waited until we could arrive.

"The strikers held a meeting last night to consider the advisability of keeping up the strike. After much discussion the men decided to call off the strike and abide by the finding of the Ontario Railway Board, provided the company will take back all the men except three, who were discharged.

"The company has the inherent right of engaging and removing employees in its own discretion.

"The Railway Co. was justified in refusing to either dismiss or remove to some other work the three employees who were alleged to have taken part in the strike.

"The question of paying the wages of these men since their removal to the time of their reinstatement is left to the company to determine.

"Each side of the arbitration must pay its own costs.

"Port Arthur, Aug. 3.—The earnings of the municipal street railway for the last month were \$5,000.

### DOCTORS MAY BE DROWNED.

Their Upturned Canoe Found On the Upper Canada.

Ottawa, Aug. 3.—It is believed that Dr. Scott of Philadelphia and his nephew, Dr. Cram of Montreal have been drowned at Deux Rivières. They went on a trip to Coburn and were canoeing on the Upper Ottawa. The finding of their upturned canoe has given rise to the belief that they have met death in the river.

Had Arm Torn Out.

North Toronto, Aug. 3.—Wm. Smith, a well-known market gardener of the 2nd concession of East York, while coming home from the city tried to shut his gate while on the wagon and was jammed between the gatepost and the wagon, receiving severe injuries. The left arm was torn out of the shoulder and the bone of the upper arm nearly snapped in two.

### CRUSH SVEABORG REVOLT

St. Petersburg, Aug. 3.—(2.35 a. m.)—On the heels of the other news comes the startling statement that the Emperor has flatly refused to accept the conditions to which Premier Stolypin agreed in his negotiations with Count Heyden, Alexander Guchkoff, Prince Nicholas Lvoff, Paul Vinogradoff and Senator Koni, for the reorganization of the Cabinet.

There is increasing apprehension that the Emperor proposes to take the final step of turning the country over to the military dictatorship of Grand Duke Nicholas.

### MURDER OF CHILD ATTEMPTED.

Newton Stonehouse and His Wife Are Under Arrest.

St. Thomas, Aug. 3.—Newton Stonehouse, aged 40, is in jail and his wife, Cora Stonehouse, aged 27 is under arrest in the hospital charged with attempting to take the life of their new-born child.

The child was found in an outhouse behind the Stonehouse home yesterday morning. The husband himself giving the alarm after hearing the cries of the little one.

It was rescued by a policeman and placed under care of a doctor and nurse and is not expected to live.

Investigation by the police and doctors revealed the fact that the child had been born during the night, although the couple protested ignorance. The arrests followed, the woman being in such a condition that she was sent to the hospital. Stonehouse has been remanded till Aug. 9.

### Tributes to Late Justice Street.

Toronto, Aug. 3.—Justice McMahon, in opening single court yesterday, paid a warm tribute to the life and work of the late Justice Street. The judge, who was a distinguished colleague, said he, "the bench and the bar has sustained a loss which arouses general regret. I had known the late Mr. Justice Street for over thirty-five years, and as a fellow-lawyer and a personal friend in the legal profession, I knew him as a genial man, an able jurist, and a most capable judge. His death will leave a place on the bench which it will be hard to fill."

### British Bowlers Win By 43.

Toronto, Aug. 3.—The British bowlers arrived in the city yesterday morning, were received by the mayor and reception committee at the city hall, and played and won their first match from the Toronto rinks on the Queen City grounds in the afternoon. He was swimming in the St. Lawrence River, and was only in the water three minutes when he was seized with cramps and sank. He was 19 years of age and the only support of a widowed mother.

### Chokes on Piece of Meat.
