A BRIDGE AT COLBORNE-ST.

At last Monday night's meeting of Council the suggestion was made by Ald. O'Rielly that the Dominion Government be memorialized to build or aid the construction of a bridge across the Scuzog river at Colborne-st., and a motion to that end was endorsed unanimously.

The request should be backed up and supported with all possible vigor by our municipal bodies and citizens generally. Better communication between the west and east sections of the town is to-day a pressing need, and would materially help in building up both wards. The locating of the C. P. R. terminal, and passenger station in the east ward would also go far in justifying a demand for improved communication, but the needs of the large staffs of men employed in the several mills and other industries on both sides of the river, deserve our best consideration. Men living in one ward or the other have to walk long distances to Wellington-st. bridge or across the river to their homes in rocky quays or on rafts. In the near future the number of men passing to and from will be augmented by the large staffs to be employed in Curlew's box factory, on the west side of the river, and in Madison Williams' new foundry and machine shop on the east bank of the river.

The new bridge should be made an overhead structure in the interests of navigation. Colborne-st. appears to be the most desirable location for the structure, because much of the traffic from the country to the west enters the town by that thoroughfare, while at the same time the site is sufficiently far north to serve the needs of the mill and foundry men and the people of the north and east wards generally.

THE RUSH CITYWARD.

The Globe: The editor of The Sun quotes the following suggestive remark made to him by a south Ontario farmer: "I saw in The Globe of recent date a column long list of houses for sale in Toronto. The buildings were not so much out of the common—lean-roofed houses for the most part—but the price was in excess less than ten thousand dollars. There must be buyers at these prices, too, else the advertisement would hardly appear. And yet I have been trying in vain for a year past to sell, at the same price, 100 acres of good farm land, with excellent barn and outbuildings, an orchard, the fruit of which will sell for \$200 a year, and a house as large as those mentioned in the advertisement referred to. Why is it?"

The editor devotes a column to the consideration of the query at the end of the quotation, and has no difficulty in arriving at the conclusion that it is the attractive power of the city that is responsible for the exorbitant prices. Many of the attractions are doubtless more apparent than real, but there is undoubtedly a fascination about the activity and bustle of a great city that appeals very forcibly to the bright-minded youth. The remedy does not, of course, lie in making cities less attractive—that is not to be thought of—but in making country life less laborious and bringing to the farmer a larger measure than he now receives of the refinements of life. These, however, have a tendency to follow closely in the footsteps of prosperity, and from what we hear of the rural districts of Ontario at the present moment the existing prosperity has already given a substantial check to the rush to this city.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

One lake vessel, the H. H. Rogers, cleared from Ashland yesterday with 13,988 tons of ore. It makes a new Lake Superior record.

New York's State law to prevent all females and all minors under 18 working in factories at night has been held to be unconstitutional.

Veterans of the U. S. civil war are said to be now dying at the rate of one hundred a day. The monthly reports for several months past have shown the death rate among the old soldiers to be in the neighborhood of 3,000 a month.

"Mr. Foy dars to do right," in cancelling that 999 years mining lease, says the London Free Press. That is a clear admission that the scheme to plunder the people was a great wrong. And but for the vigorous fight made by the Liberal press the infamous plot would have been consummated.

The labor question is becoming acute in the Northwest, and in British Columbia. The fruit-growers in the latter province find it difficult to obtain white labor, are agitating for the removal of the \$500 tax on Chinese, so that they may be able to obtain cheap coolie labor. To this the organized labor men are strongly opposed. A more difficult question to deal with, however, is the Hindoo or Sikh labor invasion, which threatens three portions of Canada. Apparently there is not enough white labor in the country to meet the demand of the railways, but there is no likelihood that the Government will permit anything like the Rand coolie slavery here.

The Provincial Board of Health has had printed upon cotton cloth notices headed as follows:

THE POLLUTING OF THE WATERS OF THESE LAKES MUST STOP.

Naturally the waters are pure and must be kept so.

These have been posted at the different watering places in the neighborhood of Peterboro, and contain warnings as well as a list of penalties for the infraction of the law. But it is stated by the Peterboro papers that conditions are such at Stony Lake and other places that the law cannot be carried out and Peterboro will have to be content to drink polluted water, although the pollution may not be discernible.

Notwithstanding their poor success in unearthing scandals during the last session of Parliament, it is said that the Tories are preparing for another campaign of scandal-hunting during the coming session. We do not blame them. They find it impossible to hurt the Government on its legislative record, and the country continues to be so absurdly prosperous that they cannot raise any kind of a cry on that head, hence the only chance of succeeding against the Government is to pry into its administration of affairs, and hint all sorts of charges in the hope that some of them will stick. The public is naturally suspicious, and it sometimes only requires reiteration and brazen effrontery to make some people believe that black is white. However, the people as a whole are not so easily fooled, and we have no doubt that the men who descend to such means to oust their opponents will meet with little success.
