Constitutional Remocrate Are Lesing In Zemstvo Elections:

Symptoms of Radical Change-Landed

Interests of All Shades Lining Up In Favor of the Government Program -Hostility to Forced Expropriation More Considered Than the Purely Political Side.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 14.-The Government attaches much importance to the defeat of the Constitutional Democrats in the zemstvo elections now under way. For years the provincial zemstyos have been the centres of the Liberal movement, and practically all the Constitutional Democratic leaders have been prominent in zemstvo work. Now, as candidates for re-election, they are going down to defeat. Kakoshkene, next to M. Roditcheff, the most brilliant of Constitutional Democratic orators in the outlawed Parliament, has been defeated by Count Sheremetieff, the notorious reactionary, and yesterday two Constitutional Democrats were defeated at Samara.

While these results certainly indicate a reaction of sentiment against the advanced program of the Constitutional Democrats, it should also be pointed out that the nobility and landed proprietors have the dominant influence in zemstvo elections, and the defeat of the Constitutional Democrats probably represents more hostility to the principle of the forced expropriation of land, to which the Constitutional Democrats are committed, than enmity toward the purely political part of their program. Czar Nicholas Writes King Edward and Latter Will Meet Kaiser Wilhelm on the 15th Inst.

London, Aug. 14 .- King Edward and Queen Alexandra returned to London yesterday from Cowes to prepare for His Majesty's annual trip to Marienbad, on which he starts to-day. The King will cross the Channel in the royal yacht Victoria and Albert to Flushing whence a special train will convey him to Friederichshof, near Weisbaden, Prussia, where he will meet Emperor William on Aug. 15.
