## STARTING THEORY ABOUT APPENDICITIS

**Prof. Blanchard, of France, Says it is Caused by Intestinal Worms—Three Varieties—Operations Unnecessary.**

M. Blanchard, a shining light in the French medical world, now comes forward with the startling new theory regarding appendicitis which entirely upsets all preconceived notions. He asserts—and says his assertion is backed by Prof. Metchnikoff, of the Pasteur Institute—that appendicitis is undoubtedly caused by intestinal worms. These are of three kinds, and the most dangerous is that known as the trypanosome, which causes the sharp pains and symptoms which indicate appendicitis.

Microscopic examination in every case of appendicitis that has come under the observation of Prof. Blanchard and Prof. Metchnikoff has revealed the presence of these parasites in the appendix. "Appendicitis," says Prof. Blanchard, "more especially occurs during the hot weather, and although not contagious or infectious, it frequently assumes the character of an epidemic in certain districts."

## CAESAREA, ON SCUGOG LAKE.

**A ONE-TIME POPULAR FISHING-RESORT, NOW DESERTED.**

Wealthy Americans no longer visit the Lake in Quest of Fish.

On Saturday afternoon last the Post representative was among the party who boarded the yacht "Jaunita" for Caesarea, Scugog Lake, and observations gleaned from a short visit are as follows:

Caesarea, four, yes, three years ago was considered by Americans and not a few Canadians, to be one of the quaintest and most beautiful summer resorts and at that time was the annual rendezvous of a number of summer tourists and campers. Large parties of Yankees summered here, so that it was quite a lively point with the best of fishing, but things have changed.

On a visit one finds that Caesarea, except for a few life-long inhabitants is as nearly deserted by the term "dead" as it can be, and rightly so. We find that there are no Americans whatever and just one or two summer visitors. And what is the cause? About four years ago, in the winter, nobody was allowed to cut air holes in the ice in Scugog Lake, and in doing this the authorities were under the impression that they were doing a good thing, but far from it—a fish, like a human being, must have air on die. When the ice began to disappear in the spring it was found that thousands of fish had been frozen to the ice, and so it happened that the waters had to be re-stocked with breeders, many being put in last fall, and fishing in these waters anywhere from the Lindsay locks up, was strictly forbidden.

Americans Driven Away.

This had its serious effect on Caesarea. Before, people visited it in scores on fishing jaunts and guides were employed at handsome figures to paddle wealthy Americans around the waters. Now there is no fishing at all and no visitors to any extent, and those guides are now out of work and doing nothing. Residents at this pleasant recreation centre are anxiously awaiting the time when notice will be given that fishing may be resumed.

On our trip there and back we noticed several dead fish floating on the surface of the water. They were numerous, and what is the cause? One thing quite noticeable on our outing up the river was that the channel is growing very woody—the growth of alders, which are growing in clusters in the middle of the river. A suggestion is made that if a couple of big steam-furrows made three or four trips up the Port Perry this nuisance would soon be a thing of the past. As it is now, the dark is apt to lead one into a marshy weed bed.
