Peterboro, Aug. 31st, 10 a.m. -Last night, as the Steamer Sunbeam was running north from Young's Foint through Clear Lake on the way to Stoney Lake, she collided with the Steamer Alert, cutting her in two. The Alert transferred her passengers to the Sunbeam and succeeded in getting within 150 yards of shore before she sank in ten feet

of water. The fault of the collision lay with the Alert; an inexperienced man, who was replacing the Captain at the wheel for a few minutes, mistook the signals and endeavored to. run acros the Sunb am's bow. Both steamers are owned by White & Grills, of Lakefield.

CREAT RUSH FOR LAND.

Will Take Over a Million Acres to Pro-

vide Veteraps with Grants. The applications for land grants by the veterans of the South African war, the North-West rebellion, and the Fenian raids now number 2,000 and to satisfy these claimants will take over 1,250,000 acres, and constitute a serious drain on the surveyed lands of New Ontario. An erroneous impression has got abroad that all vet rans who have received medals for service against the Fenians are entitled to the grants, and have to be refused. The Act limits the veterans of '66 and '70 in at least two ways: they must at present be residents of Ontario, and they must have both enlisted for service and served in Ontario at the time of the raids. The decision will not be reached

DR. COULTER GETS A DECREE.

Interlocutory Judgment in Celebrated Case over Oronhyatekha's \$5,000.

New York Sun, Aug. 29th: Dr. C. L. Coulter has obtained an interlocutory judgment compelling Oronhyatekha, head of the Independent Order of Foresters, to restore \$5,000 to the treasury of that organiza-

While the suit was brought in the his own interest, except as a member of the great body of Foresters and despite the fact that the action was in the interest of the organization, its official representatives were joinded with Oronhyatekha as

defenuants. Dr. Coulter's action was based on the payment of \$5,000 to Oronhyatakha for special services in connection with the planning and building of the Foresters' Temple in Torente, which cost nearly \$1,000,000 Dr. Coulter showed that under the constitution of the Order Oronhya takha, as Supreme Chief Ranger, received a salary of \$10,000 a year, He asserted that the extra payment of \$5,000 was a mere gift, for which there was no authority.

The action was brought in the Supreme Court of New York County. The defendants fought it on grounds that the plaintiff had legal capacity to sue, that the court | the hand is still very painful. had no jurisdiction, and that the Order should have been made a p'a'ntiff instead of a defendant. It should not be allowed to "stand" more than four or five minutes, and all the liquid should then be poured off. Nine people out of ten add water to the teapot after the first supply is drawn off. This is a mistake.

-Tea is always acceptable in the afternoon. If one is very hot it induces a gentle perspiration, which has a cooling effect. There need be no difficulty in having it rightly or wrongly infused, because you may prepare it when convenient, and when ready pour it into other pots, and it can be kept warm without passing thought.
