The Late John Magwood. We regret exceedingly to have to announce the very sudden death, from apendicitis, of one of the most

prominent citizens of this town-Mr. John Magwood-in his 53rd year. The sad event occurred last Sunday. Mr. Magwood was born in the township of Cavan, where he spent his early years. When about 21 years of age he settled on a bush farm in the township of Eldon, and soon became a prosperous farmer. He has had in a marked degree the respect and confidence of his friends and the public

He had been for about 40 years a consistent member of the Methodist church, and for many years an office-holder. In politics Mr. Magwood was conservative. He was a Justice of the Peace for the county of Victoria, and was for many years a member of Lindsay Town Council. His widow and family have the sincere sympathy of the people of the town and county.
