Fire broke out about 12.10 o'clock Sept. 19th in the bakery shop of A. J. Sproule, Port Perry, and inside of two hours a row of brick stores were a mass of ruins. At first the wind was moderate, but, rising shortly afterwards, swept the blaze along towards the lake and endangered the entire town. The stores lost are owned by C. H. Allison, druggist; J. A. Murray, dentist; Miss Harrison, dressmaking; G. A. Powers, tailor; canning and evaporating factory baker; T. C. Cawker, butcher; W. Tremeer, dwelling; G. Dawson, bargeneral merchants; W. H. The blaze was a very spectacular one, the llames inluminating the whole town. The loss is placed at \$50,000, and will be largely covered by insurance. The block burned is a total loss. Dozens of plate glass in stores on the opposite side of the main street on which the fire raged were cracked and ruined by the heat. Several families living over the stores have been rendered homeless by the fire.


