Sept. 22. - The of Railway Trainmen employed on all railroads centering in Wilkes-Barre held a secret meeting at Kingston yesterday. The object was to take some action on the question of Brotherhood men hauling coal from the mines where non-union men are employed. The only information that would be given out was that a resolution had been adopted requesting the secretary of each local division to write to Grand Master H. H. Morrissey, requesting him to come here at once.

MINERS WILL NEVER YIELD.

Claim They Can Hold Out All Winter, If Necessary.

New York, Sept. 22.-President Mitchell, before a mass meeting of workingmen, declared that the anthracite mine workers would remain out all winter if necessary to gain their end; and were in a position to do so. "After four weary months," he said, "the miners stand as strong as when the strike began. They will never return to the mines until they are treated as American workingmen should be, and, thanks to the generous assistance given to them they can and will stand out all winter, if necessary, to win this fight." To Solve the Question.

Reading, Pa., Sept. 22.-There passed through this city yesterday three trains containing a total of 150 cars of anthracite, or about 4,-500 tons. The Reading Company's officials here say they believe that the increased shipments of washery coal promised from now on will solve the question of supplying the market with fuel during the strike.

Ottawa, Sept. 22 .- W. T. R. Preston of the immigration staff, was examined on Saturday for discovery in his action for libel against The Ottawa Journal, The examination was very brief. The case will be tried at the Assizes, which commence on Thursday.

Tunnel's Fatal Heat.





STRIKERS WILL NOT YIELD.

Because It Would Mean the Dismemberment of Their Union.

Washington, Sept. 23. - President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor said yesterday that the striking miners in the Pennsylvania coal fields were prepared to hold out for months. He said the miners were disposed to make concessions, but the operators had refused all overtures from them, and that the men now "are not going to yield." "The strikers," he said, "are re

ceiving all the supplies they really need, and can continue their fight indefinitely. The Federation will do all it can to aid them. One thing certain, that the strikers will never yield on the basis of the dismemberment of their union organization which is all that has raised them even ever so little above their desperate condition."

SPENCER'S NEW AIRSHIP.

Aeronaut Describes His Machine as Per fect Steering in Light . Wind.

London, Sept. 22 .- Stanley Spencer, the aeronaut, who sailed his self-constructed airship a distance thirty miles Friday, received many congratulations yesterday. He was not disposed to exaggerate his achievement in steering an airship over London, yet he asserts that his machine is absolutely perfect in gentle wind. He had intended to cross St. Paul's Cathedral and headed that way. He found it was too foggy, however, and turned toward the West End, where it was clearer. In an interview he said:

"In a strong wind I should require a stronger balloon. The steering was absolutely perfect, and never made more than a four-foot pitch."

This is not the impression conveyed to the causal observer, to whom it appeared that the machine was not under anything approaching perfect control. At times it whirled apparently in an eccentric manner, but for considerable stretches it behaved won- skilled specialists. derfully well in the wind. Great Britain Begins Construction of New Batteries at Kingston.

London, Sept. 18 .- A despatch to The Daily Mail from Kingston, Jamaica, says the construction of new battery of six-inch guns has been begun at the eastern extremity of the harbor there.
