HOW WE EDUCATE FARMERS.

C. C. James, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, writing in Toronto University Monthly of the work of the Ontario Agricultural College, says:

In the sixteen years (1888-1903), 139 students have passed their examinations and received their degree at the O.A.C. An interesting feature of these 139 young men is that they are to be found in responsible positions doing splendid work. Many of them are working out the problems of life on Ontario farms, one of them has occupied a seat in the legislature, three of them are directing work in the Provincial Department of Agriculture, no less than twelve are on the staff of the Agricultural College, 1902, four are in the management positions even in far-away India and the Philippines. Through the press, on the platform, in practical farm life, in experimental work, along all lines of progressive agriculture in this country the graduates and associates of the Ontario Agricultural College are to be found to-day. The college is advertised by its students.

It has cost Canada to operate the Intercolonial Railway about \$25,000,000 more than it earned. The Grand Trunk undertakes to operate the Winnipeg-Moncton line without cost to the country. That is worth taking into account.

Parks, the bullying New York talking delegate, who was convicted of blackmailing employers of labor by threats of ordering strikes, has been condemned to three years' hard labor in Sing Sing. The punishment fits the crime and it should be a lesson to all so inclined.

A diagram prepared by the Trade and Commerce Department shows that since 1868 there have been four periods of trade expansion in Canada exactly ten years apart. The last was in 1898, and the question naturally suggests itself, will the coincidence hold good indications it will not. It looks as though the new year upon which the country entered last month will be the most prosperous in our history.

viands any chemical additions are not only useless for nutritional purposes, but are positively dangerous by hindering growth, sapping strength and interfering with the proper elimination of effete tissue elements.

Globe: Mr. Carnegie doubtless knows a good deal about the United States, but as the agriculturist is the same all over the world it is not presumptuous on the part of an outsider to make a guess at what the American farmer would do if he found that his products suffer in the English market. He would begin to enquire why, and when he found that it was because of ultra protection in his own country he would carry the investigation still further and inquire what good high duties did him. He would find that they did him no good—quite the contrary. Protection would then have the battle of its life on its hands.

Speaking of the enforcement of the English Education Act, Lieut.-Gov. Clarke, who has just returned home from a visit to the old country, says: "One instance that particularly struck me was the action of a magistrate who was an evangelical Anglican, who paid the tax of a man brought before him, rather than inflict the penalty of the law upon him. In another case the authorities were unable to obtain an auctioneer to sell the goods of one of the resisting ratepayers, and had to bring one from a distance. The more we hear about the workings of this act the more we are convinced that it will yet cause the overthrow of the Balfour Government."

Weekly Sun, Toronto: Mr. Borden's speech on the Grand Trunk Pacific agreement has not set the country on fire. His proposal to extend the Intercolonial to Winnipeg by the construction of lines here and there, and the construction of connecting links, and to aid railway construction from Winnipeg to the Pacific, is too complicated a scheme to take readily with the public, while, in the matter of cost, it repeats the objectionable feature of the Government project. Would it not have been better for Mr. Borden to have taken a position of out-and-out opposition to the Government scheme, instead of bringing forward a scheme of his own? It is his own that is the subject of many of the objections that apply to that of the Government? Had he taken this stand, he would have shown his confidence in the country. He would have shown his belief that Canada will develop on its own merits and without forced contributions from the public purse.

Montreal Witness: A graceful compliment was paid to Canada by the British Admiralty in giving the name "Dominion" to the latest great battleship, and the selection of the Princess Louise to perform the ceremony of christening was in keeping with it. The launching was, however, a reminder that Canada contributes nothing to the support of the navy. It is not flattering to our self-esteem to reflect that the battleship that bears the name of another colony, the "Good Hope," was a present to the navy from South Africa, while the "Dominion" is a complement to a dependency that declines to contribute anything to the first line of imperial defence and protection. Apart from this unplesant reflection, it is important to note that the three great battleships, of which the "Dominion" is one, are by far the largest, swiftest and most powerful war vessels afloat. Hitherto the United States battleships held that position.

Will Exhibit in Toronto.

SYLVESTER MFG COMPANY AT THE INDUSTRIAL FAIR.

Will Show a Superbly Fitted Launch, Various Sizes of Gasoline Engines and a Full Range of Superior Farm Implements.

A Post representative visited the Sylvester Works to-day and was surprised to see such a large staff of employees busy in the various departments turning out implements for next season's trade. Besides the large numbers of binders, rakes, drills, plows, and other farming implements manufactured this season, the firm has in addition manufactured and sold a great number of gasoline engines. The firm intend making a grand display of their goods at the Dominion Exhibition in Toronto, the Western Fair at London, and perhaps the Ottawa Fair. A couple of gasoline launches will be exhibited at the Toronto Fair. Our representative was shown one by Mr. Harry Bricknell, manager of the gasoline department. "These are a yacht we are proud of," remarked Mr. Bricknell. "The craft he alluded to is a daisy in every particular—one we would be glad to own. The hull was made by Mr. J. T. Perrin, whose reputation as a boatbuilder is well known. It is 21 feet in length with 5 feet 8 inch beam, and will accommodate about sixteen people, come that. The bow and stern are decked in birdseye maple and oak, and the seats are also made of the latter wood. It is fitted with a 3-horse power gasoline engine and is nicely upholstered. In addition to this exhibit the firm will show five gasoline engines, one stationary and four portable, of various sizes, ranging from eight to one and a half. They will also show the following goods: One horse combined drill, one 14 shoe drill, six foot binder, five foot mower, eight foot rake, one King cultivator, one land roller, one four section spring tooth cultivator, one sectional seeding machine, one stiff tooth combined cultivator, one spring tooth combined cultivator, one pulper, one weeder, one 7 inch plow, one 8 inch plow, one gang plow, one 4-section light clip harrow, and one 4-section heavy clip harrow.

A CAMPER'S QUESTION ANSWERED.

The following from the Peterboro Examiner may settle a doubtful point in the minds of some of our Lindsay campers:

(To the Editor of the Examiner.)

Dear Sir,—I observed in Saturday's Examiner the following enquiry;

Dear Sir,—I would like through your valuable paper to enquire if campers along the Ottonabee River can camp near the water's edge, and on land that is practically of no value or if there is any distance from the water's edge reserved for campers.

I have not noticed that you have answered the query, consequently the writer is still lacking the information.

The facts are that the lands abutting the shores of the Ottonabee river are attached to the farms connected therewith, and no one has the right to enter upon these lands without the consent of the owner.

Some townships reserve a strip of land a chain wide along the shores of the river, but the townships of North and South Monaghan and Ottonabee have never done this, nor have the townships of Smith or Douro. Consequently permission should be obtained from the owners of the lands adjacent to the water, or persons going upon these lots are trespassing. I do not know of any cases where a request has been refused to allow tents to be pitched for a few days, where the campers conduct themselves properly, but it is desirable for those who wish to camp near the water's edge of any of the lands in these townships to first obtain consent.—Yours truly,
