OUR STREET LIGHTING SYSTEM.

(From Saturday's Daily.) Unless some unexpected hitch occurs, our Council will discuss next Tuesday evening the ratification of a contract with the Light, Heat & Power Co., of Lindsay, to light our streets with 60 electric lamps of 1500 candle power capacity...

But there are too many points in connection with the town lighting system to permit of their enumeration within the scope of one or a half-dozen articles of moderate length, and we shall confine our present remarks to a brief criticism of the claim made at a recent meeting of the Police and Lighting committee...

Let us see how the 60 lamp theory pans out. When the aldermen plotted the lights on the town map they discovered that if they wished to be even fairly generous 86 lamps would have to be placed. The price fixed by the Company being \$50 per lamp, and the amount available for light being placed at \$3000, (an increase

of \$700 or \$800 over the sum paid for number of lights would have to be reduced to 60, which will entail the cutting out of 26 lights. This will cause endless grumbling, citizens who are not served will exercise constant pressure upon their favorite aldermen...

There is one other important point. The corporation of Lindsay embraces about 1,800 acres, the corporation of Peterboro (exclusive of Ashburnham village), about 1500 acres. We have never heard the town of Peterboro spoken of as being brilliantly lighted, yet there are 95 lamps of 2000 candle power on its streets.

Note.—Council did not meet till Wednesday evening, when the agreement submitted by the Light, Heat & Power Co., and the Town Solicitor's opinion thereon, were referred unread to the Police and Lighting committee.
