As we go to press with this week's issue of The Post the 21st annual Lindsay Fair may be said to be in full swing. Every department is crowded with exhibits, and the weather outlook being most favorable no doubt a huge crowd will throng the grounds to-day (Friday) and to-morrow.

THE STREET LIGHTING CONTRACT.

At two meetings of the Police and Lighting Committee of the Council, at which all members of Council were present, a draft agreement submitted by the Light, Heat & Power Co. as the basis of a seven year contract for a sixty arc light street system was given careful consideration. The committee discussed it clause by clause in conjunction with Town Solicitor Hopkins' report thereon, the result being that a number of emendations and additions were recommended by various members and adopted.

It is now up to Council to accept or reject the offer—and incidentally to select the streets which must be deprived of light in order that 60 lamps plotted by the committee on the town map a couple of weeks ago may be reduced in number to the limit fixed. The task embodies the essentials for some dramatic differences of opinion in which the residents on the streets threatened would cordially join did they but know what is in store for them.

We deem it our duty to keep the citizens well informed as to the progress of the negotiations and the nature of the contract to be entered into. As Mayor Sootheran remarked Thursday evening, the contract lasts for seven years and represents a tidy sum of money. As every ratepayer will have to contribute towards the cost of the new service, it is proper that all should be afforded an opportunity of knowing beforehand what sort of bargain is being presented for acceptance by their civic representatives.

For the information of our readers we publish in this week's issue the text of the Company's draft agreement, with the Solicitor's comments, and also give a synopsis of the amendments made by the committee.

The same statement, cannot, unfortunately, be made regarding the County Court judges of that province, and the Toronto Weekly Sun points out that if the Commons acquiesces in the changes made by the Senate in the bill respecting cattle killed on railway crossings, the Ontario farmer will have to sue for damages before a judge who is under obligation to the other party in the case. There is no question but that the acceptance of judges is indefensible and if the occupants of the bench do not realize the fact, they should be compelled to do so by act of Parliament. What is the relation of the judges in Quebec and the other provinces to this question? Can they say with Ontario's High Court judges, "We pay our way"?

PETERBORO ELECTRIC POWER

CHEAP POWER OBTAINABLE HERE ATTRACTING OTHER TOWNS.

A Proposal may be Made to Supply Power to Outside Manufactories. (Peterboro Examiner, Monday.) That Peterboro is destined to become one of the most prominent manufacturing cities in the Dominion, is being amply evidenced. As an indication of the fact that the advantages possessed by Peterboro in respect of cheap power, are being recognized by other municipalities, one of the most highly quoted authorities on municipal questions in Ontario, and a member of the Toronto City Council, expressed his opinion with reference to a town about 50 miles from Peterboro, Bowmanville, that it would be cheaper to obtain power from Peterboro, than to generate it at home. If this be the truth, and there seems to be no reason to doubt the fact, it places Peterboro in an extremely advantageous position. If power can be generated here and transmitted for a distance of nearly fifty miles cheaper than it can be produced elsewhere, this should prove a very effective argument in favour of manufacturing industries requiring power, to locate here. As a matter of fact, although it may not be generally known, electrical energy is sold in Peterboro at a lower rate than in places which claim to have the cheapest power in Ontario. As a matter of comparison it may be stated that in Bowmanville electric light for residences costs \$3.60 per year per 16 cp. light, as compared with \$1 per year in Peterboro.

It would appear that the great advantages possessed by this town in having at our doors practically an unlimited supply of power, are not fully appreciated by the majority of our citizens. The fact remains, however, that there are few, if any towns or cities in Canada where power can be produced as cheaply as in Peterboro, and instead of transmitting the power to other towns to turn the wheels of industries there, why should not these industries be induced to locate here, and obtain their power at first hand?

It is possible that on the strength of the opinion of the municipal authority, quoted above, steps may be taken with a view of endeavouring to secure power from Peterboro for use in neighboring towns, and should there be a surplus of power after all the local industries have been supplied, and all the industries induced to locate here which it is possible to obtain, this might be supplied, but the first care should be to obtain for our town all the manufacturing industries possible. This town is destined by nature to become a great manufacturing centre, but this can only be accomplished by centralizing the industries in this town, and not by supplying power to outside towns, which will reap the benefit, and become to some extent competitors as centres of industry.

Cheap Domestic Lighting.

The Examiner of Saturday contained an article taken from the Canadian Engineer, setting forth Orillia's success with her electric lighting in furnishing cheap light. The article stated that the flat rate for electric lighting for residences was 25 cents per month for each 16-candle-power lamp, and stores, hotels, halls and churches, are charged 35 cents each light, with a discount of 20 per cent for prompt payment. Think that to competition we can do better than that in Peterboro. The Orillia rate for residences is 83 per year for each 16-candle-power lamp. In Peterboro a householder using ten lamps pays \$10 a year net, in Orillia a householder using the same number of lamps pays \$30 a year—or, less 20 per cent, discount for prompt payment, \$24 net, or nearly two and a half times more than is paid in Peterboro. In Peterboro the charge for light on the metre basis is five cents per thousand watts; in Orillia the charge is 18 cents per thousand. In Peterboro the charge per light for church is \$4.20 per lamp, with 20 per cent. off; in Peterboro the rate is \$1 per light, or even less—one church in town getting its 75 lights for \$70 per year. In Peterboro there is no charge for metre rental; in Orillia the metre charge is \$1.80 per year.

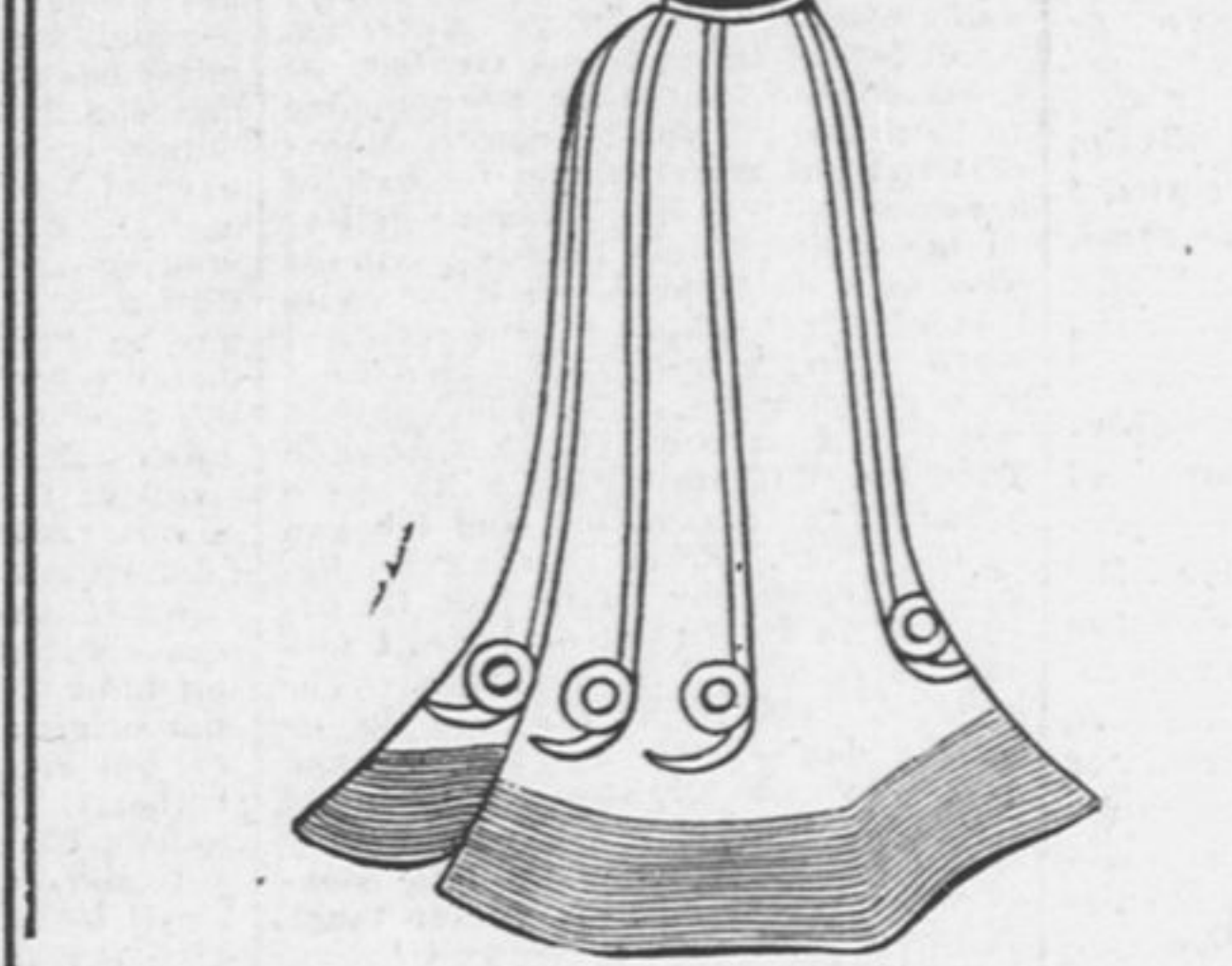
