What is Happening in Town and the Country About Us.

—Quite a large-sized building has been erected on Albert Duck's farm, south of the town, for the new railway camp.

—Five carloads of brick were shipped out this week by Mr. S. J. Fox, three going to Campbellford and two to Whitby.

—It is said that this is to be a great year for hickory nuts in Ontario. The trees are reported to be fairly bending under their loads.

—Strength and vigor come of good food, fully digested. "Fococ," a ready-to-serve wheat and barley food, adds no burden, but sustains, nourishes, invigorates.

—The farm of Mr. Alex. McArthur, in Ops, two miles south of the town has been bought by Mr. Jas. Robertson. The price paid was a little less than six thousand dollars.

—A concrete wharf 170 feet long, 14 feet wide and 15 feet wide, is being constructed below the Government lock at Fenelon Falls. It will be completed in a month.

—Mr. James Porter, of Longford Mills has sold his farm of 125 acres and a gore of 16 acres of bush land to Mr. Robert Pogue, of Glandine, for \$6,000 cash. Mr. Porter was in town today closing the transaction.

—Mr. Felix Gassien, of the local G.T.R. staff accompanied by his wife, left for Toronto last Monday to bring their youngest son home after undergoing a very successful operation in a private hospital at that city.

—Mr. Robt. Maitland, of the south ward, has resigned his position as G. T. R. engineer, and has purchased a restaurant business in Peterboro, of which he took possession last Saturday. Mrs. Maitland and two children left town Monday.

—St. Louis is to have a 4,200 room hotel for the world's fair visitors. It will cover 14 acres of land and have a frontage of 2,500 feet. You can imagine for yourself what the size of the dining saloon in the shirt front of the clerk will be.

—Instead of placing two sidings east of the iron bridge, as was first intended, the G. T. R. have decided to construct three. These sidings will be of great length, each being capable of accommodating two double header trains of thirty cars each.

—Mr. Geo. D. Fitzgerald, the well known cheese buyer, has a pacing horse that can go a mile in 2:27. The feat was accomplished on the Peterboro track the other day. The horse is named Molly Keswick and is a half sister of the famous Minnie Keswick, owned by Mr. Curtis.

—An observing citizen remarked that the contractors for the Lindsay, Bobcaygeon & Pontypool Railway have four gangs of men in connection with the construction of the road, viz.: first, the working gang; second, the drinking gang; third, the gang that is constantly coming; and fourth, the gang that is going.

—Two evangelists of the Seventh Day Adventists persuasion have been in town for some weeks, proselytizing. One citizen claims that his domestic happiness has been destroyed by the change of religious belief of some of his nearest and dearest relatives and threatens punishment on the Seventh Day advocates, who observe Saturday as the Sabbath day, the same as the Jews.
