The village Council met on 21st inst., members all present, the Rev. in the chair. Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. The Clerk read a letter from Dr. McKay re Union-st., also from F. M. McIntyre re collector, which were filed. Moved by Messrs. Adams and Patterson, that the tender of the Canada Life Assurance Co., of \$3,349.85 for the debentures be accepted.—Carried. Moved by Messrs. Patterson and Adams, that the Council borrow \$500 to pay on contract on town hall, and that the Reeve and Mr. C. E. Weeks be a committee to negotiate the same.—Carried. Moved by Messrs. Adams and Patterson, that the communication received from Dr. McKay be now discussed.—Carried. Moved by Messrs. Adams and McKee, that the changes in plan of town hall made by Mr. McLean, respecting window in basement, are satisfactory to this Council, and that if Mr. McLean finds any other change necessary during the progress of the work that would benefit the building, that he advise the Council of the same without adding to the cost.—Carried. Moved by Messrs. Patterson and Adams, that our solicitor, Mr. C. E. Weeks, be asked if in his opinion Dr. John McKay is illegally occupying with part of his fence and building a portion of the east side of Union-st., or any other fences or buildings belonging to any others that may be at the present on any of the streets of the village.—Carried. Moved by Messrs. McKee and Patterson, that the Clerk notify granted the use of building on town hall lot at a rental of one dollar per month until sold, if required so long.—Carried. Moved by Messrs. McKee and Patterson, that the Clerk notify Mr. McGowan to pay the sum of \$50 for use of stable to our treasurer.—Carried. Moved by Messrs. Patterson and Adams, that the commissioners on sidewalks and crossings be authorized to build a crossing across Napdale-st., to corner of Queen-st.—Carried. Adjourned until 29th inst. J. C.
