News Generally Believed. This is the news that has reached wounded. this city and, while it lacks official confirmation from Japanese sources, it is generally believed, and The Evening Standard openly announces the fall of the fortress on the authority of its Tientsin correspondent. Under date of yesterday this correspondent, of whose reliability there can be no doubt, writes:

"Have good reason to believe from private information that the Japanese have effected an entrance to Port Arthur, and that the fall of the fortress is consequently virtually accomplished. The Japanese, however, are reluctant to say anything offcially until the fighting is altogether suspended. The entrance was cifected at the Etseshan forts. The Japanese occupied the Peiyushan parade grounds within the forts at dawn of the 24th, from which point they swept down with an unceasing fire throughout the day. The Japanese casualties were very heavy, but their courage remained undaunted to

the end." Losses Enormous on Both Sides. London, Aug. 29 .- A despatch from Fusan to Lloyd's Weekly says: "After a desperate day and night of fighting the Japanese penetrated the principal defence of Port Arthur. Their guns dominate the entire town. They hold every position they won despite the desperate and furious counter attacks of the Russians.

Desperate Sortie Likely. A despatch from Kobe to The Weekly Despatch dated Sunday says news from a reliable source states that the Japanese have captured the outlying fortifications of Port Arthur. The Russians still hold the citadel on Antseshan, northwest of the town, the Golden Hill forts and the forts on Tiger's Tail Promontory. Japanese hold the parade ground. The fall of the fortress is believed to be imminent. The Russians are likely as a last extremity to make a desperate sortie, for which it is believed they are in readiness.

"A wounded Japanese officer, who was taken prisoner, escaped observation after his wound was dressed and killed himself by dashing his head against the stones. "On Aug. 27 the enemy had not assumed any defensive movement at any point along the whole front, and our troops retired gradually to new positions. At about 2 o'clock in the afternoon it was discovered that the Japanese were moving on Laempine." Cut Army in Two.

Tokio, Aug. 29 .- The general staff maintained silence throughout yesterday concerning the fighting in the vicinity of Liaoyang. It is reported that Gen. Kumpki has seized and cut the railroad south of Mukden, thus separating the Russian forces and cutting Liacyang from a direct line of retreat, but confirmation of this report cannot be obtained. The fighting reported east and southeast of Liaoyang is regarded here as preliminary to a larger contest in the immediate vicinity of Liaoyang. It is expected that Generals Kuroki, Oku and Nodzu will press forward speed-

Japan Shows Her Mettle, Washington, Aug. 29 .- Japan has addressed a note to the powers informing them that unless Russia forthwith disarms her warships in Shanghai Japan will be forced to take whatever steps she deems necessary to protect her interests. Mr. Takahira, the Japanese Minister, called at the State Department Saturday and left with Mr. Adee, the acting Secretary of State, the com-

munication of the Tokio Govern-The Minister spent some time with Acting Secretary Adee, but further than to receive the communication, Mr. Adee was careful not to disclose the attitude of this Government, although the Minister was assured that the continuation of Chinese neutrality was earnestly hoped for by the United States. 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
