## THE NEW SCHOOL RULES. WEEKLY POST LETTER BOX

### NEW SUBJECTS INTRODUCED.

Regulations Approved by the Educational Department.

Deputy Minister of Education Millar has handed out the new regulations approved by the Education Department. Copies are expected to be printed in about a week, when they will be given out to the inspectors, principals of High Schools, Collegiate Institutes and County Model Schools. In about ten days a supply will be ready for furnishing principals of other schools.

Some new subjects are introduced into the Public School curriculum. More attention is to be given to literature, nature study and art. Constructive work, clay modelling, as well as elementary science, received some prominence. The obligatory subjects of the fifth form are: reading, literature, grammar, composition, history, geography, arithmetic, mensuration and elementary science. Work in the other subjects is left to the judgment of trustees and inspectors. High School Entrance Examinations. Admission to High Schools and Collegiate Institutes rests by statute with the Entrance Board of Examiners. The subjects for admission are: Part I.—Literature, history, art, physiology and hygiene, nature study. Part II.—Reading (written and oral), writing, spelling, geography, grammar, composition, arithmetic. The literature will embrace the careful reading during the previous year of at least four suitable works selected by the principal for each pupil, from a list of supplementary reading in English literature prepared by the Public School Inspector. The written examination in reading will be based on eight passages, and will be designed as a test of the candidates' understanding of what he reads. There will be no written examinations in Part I. The report of the principal to the Public School Inspector being taken in lieu thereof.

Public School Leaving Examinations. Public school leaving examinations may be held in schools having a fifth form under direction of the principal, who shall consult the Inspector regarding character and scope of such examination. The preparation of the question and examination of answer papers are to be left to the principal, but subject to the advice of the Inspector.

### High School Program.

The High School program of study provides for: (a) The general course; (b) The commercial course; (c) The manual training course; (d) The household science course; (e) The art course; (f) The agricultural course; (g) The course for matriculation; (h) The course for teachers' certificates. Power is left to the Board and principal to select subjects to be taken up. The following subjects are obligatory on all pupils: Geography, arithmetic and mensuration, English grammar, writing, physical culture, and history. It is provided that a lesson of thirty minutes every day or equivalent thereof throughout each year of the lower school shall be given in elementary science. Teachers Non-professional Certificates. Several changes are made regarding requirements for these certificates. Every candidate must have read carefully during the previous year at least four suitable works in English literature. There will be no examination held by the department in science hereafter. Schools must be properly equipped in order to take up work for teachers' non-professional examinations. They will consist of those for junior, senior and district certificates. It is provided that the subjects for the examinations for second and third-class certificates shall be such as will guarantee fitness on the part of the candidate to teach the subjects to be taken up in elementary schools.

### Junior Non-professional Exam.

The obligatory subjects are as follows: Part I.—Reading, book-keeping, and business papers, art and elementary science of the lower school. Part II.—English composition, English literature, history (Ancient, British and Canadian), algebra, geometry, physics, and four suitable works in English literature. There will be no examination held by the department in science hereafter. Schools must be properly equipped in order to take up work for teachers' non-professional examinations. They will consist of those for junior, senior and district certificates. It is provided that the subjects for the examinations for second and third-class certificates shall be such as will guarantee fitness on the part of the candidate to teach the subjects to be taken up in elementary schools.

### Two Classes.

## A BY-LAW

To authorize the issue of Debentures of the County of Victoria to the amount of \$40,000.00 for the Purchase of a Site and for the Erection of Buildings thereon for a House of Refuge for the said County.

WHEREAS, the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria have, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 38 of the Statute of Ontario for the year 1903, determined to purchase a site on which to erect and equip a House of Refuge for the County of Victoria.

And Whereas, in order thereto it will be necessary to issue debentures of the County of Victoria for the sum of \$40,000.00, as hereinafter provided, (which is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this by-law) the proceeds of the said debentures to be applied to the said purposes and to no other;

And Whereas, under the provisions of Section 4 of chapter 37 of the Statute of Ontario for the year 1904, it is not necessary for the Council of any County to submit to the electors, or to obtain the assent of the electors, to any by-law providing for the issue of debentures for the purpose of raising money for the erection of buildings for a House of Refuge, where the amount required to be raised does not exceed \$40,000.00;

And Whereas, the total amount required by the Municipal Act to be raised annually by special rate for paying the said debt and interest is the sum of \$2,944.00; whereas \$1,608.00 is to be so raised annually for payment of interest during the currency of said debentures and the said \$1,608.00 is to be so raised annually for the purpose of creating a sinking fund for payment of the debt secured by said debentures;

And Whereas, the amount of the whole rateable property of the County of Victoria, according to the last revised and equalized Assessment Roll thereof is \$11,566,215.00;

And Whereas, the said County has no debenture debt, but the said County has by its By-Law numbered 567 guaranteed the repayment of debentures regularly issued by the Village of Fanelon Falls—a municipality within the said County of Victoria—to the amount of seventy-five thousand dollars;

THEREFORE, the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Victoria enacts as follows:—

(1) That for the purpose of raising the said debentures of the County of Victoria to the amount of \$40,000.00 as aforesaid shall be issued, in sums of not less than \$1,000.00 each, on the First day of October, 1904; each of which debentures shall be dated on the said First day of October, and shall be payable on the First day of October, 1924, at the Bank of Montreal, in the Town of Lindsay, in the said County of Victoria.

(2) Each of the said debentures shall be signed by the Warden of the said County of Victoria, and also by the Treasurer thereof, and the Clerk of the said County of Victoria shall attach thereto the Corporate Seal of the said Municipality.

(3) The said debentures shall bear interest at the rate of four per centum per annum, payable half yearly at the said Bank on the First days of April and October in each year, and shall have attached to them coupons for payment of said interest; which coupons shall be signed by the said Warden and Treasurer.

(4) During the currency of the said debentures there shall be raised annually by special rate on all the rateable property in the said County of Victoria the said sum of \$1,608.00 for payment of interest on the said debentures, and the said sum of \$1,644.00 for the purpose of creating a sinking fund for payment of the debt thereby secured, the said sum of \$2,944.00 to be raised annually by special rate as aforesaid during each of the said twenty years.

(5) This By-Law shall take effect on the first day of October, 1904, and shall be in force until the said day of October, 1904.
