RAINS DELAY HARVESTING

Edmonton District Only Place in the Territories Yet Struck By Frost King-A Cheerful Factor in the Situation -Details of Damage Districts in Manitoba-If Wet Weather Continues Damage Over.

Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 13.-Frost in varying degree, was pretty well universal in Manitoba Sunday night. Yesterday cold and drizzling rains make all harvesting operations impossible. Curiously enough the Territories seem to have entirely escaped, with the exception of the Edmonton district, where the thermometer touched 30. At Calgary it registered 32, but throughout the main territorial wheat area, from Moose Jaw to Moosomin considerably higher temperatures were recorded, due to the prevailing southwest winds. This is the cheerful factor of the much green wheat, while in Manitoba the grain is mostly in shock and past damage from frost. The most severe frost was experienced in Southern Manitoba-Estavan, Emerson and Pierson registering 28 degrees and Morden 30. Wheat, however, in these parts is almost all cut. Central Manitoba, including Portage and Brandon districts, though not heavily touched, may suffer more, as harvesting is not so far advanced. The northern parts of Birtle and Minnedosa were badly hit, and the crops being late, wheat will lose heavily in grade. But in Birtle, especially the bulk of the crop is oats, which is not so susceptible
