

I did not want the seat unless it was mine, and I said I would resign at once and run again, but I understand that was impossible while the election petition was pending, so I suggested seeing the other side and telling them what I proposwould want to go on if they had nothing against me personally, and there were no disclosures that I feared. Mr. Hellmuth saw Mr. Johnston as what the petitioners wanted all along was to have the seat vacated. That is the whole story. There has been no saw-off, no bargain. I have conducted the matter on my own account, without any party aid or sug-

gestion, and am satisfied with the
