SCHOOLBOY SOLDIERS.

Rudyard Kipling Thinks Every Young Lad Should be Well Drilled.

In an article in the British Navy League Journal in favor of compulsory military service in England, the novelist, Rudyard Kipling, proposes an elaborate system of military training which he says was drafted "by on: who really knows what he writes about." It provides that all schools shall be required to include military drill as part of their regular routice, that every boy between the ages of 12 and 17 shall be required to obtain a certificate showing that he has successfully completed a course of physical and elementary military Gill and that boroughs and counties shall form cadet corps in which all boys should serve for at least two years. It is also provided that free arms and ammunition shall be supplied to such corps, that officers assigned to them as instructors may count the time thus occupied in computing pensions and that the instruction given to boys shall be virtually the same as that given to volunteers. Mr. Kipling believes that every boy of school age should receive military training, and thus be made at least partly ready for actual service at the cell of the government. The same belief prevails to some extent herein the United States, and we believe it will apread as time advances. 

J. P. MORGAN ALSO ON TRAIN

Episcopal Party Was Badly Shaken But Sustained No Injuries-Engine of Train Derailed But Cars Stayed on the Track-Terrific Crash Followed Eagine Striking a Wandering

Engine on the Track. East Brookfield, Mass., Sept. 24 .special train conveying the Archbishop of Canterbury from Bar Harbor, Maine, to Washington, was wrecked on the Boston and Albany Division of the New York Central

Railroad, near the station here, yesterday morning. The Archbishop was not injured, although considerably shaken up. J. Pierpont Morgan of New York, who was also on the train accompanying the Archbishop, was also shaken up but not hurt. The special, running at the rate of 60 miles an hour, was just passing the station when a detached locomotive, which had been drawing a train on the North Brookfield branch, ran on to the main line. The engineer of the special sighted a danger signal, but owing to the high speed of the train and the slippery rails due to the mist of early morning be found it impossible to more than slightly reduce the speed of his lecomotive. The engineer of the branch engine heard the on-rush of the special, but he had not time to move out of the

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
