Liverpool Wheat Futures Close Higher, Chicago Lower—Live Stock Markets—The Latest Quotations.

Tuesday Evening, Sept. 4. Liverpool wheat futures closed today 1/4 to 1/2 higher than yesterday and corn futures 1/2 higher.

CATTLE MARKETS. Cables Unchanged—Best Grade Cattle Are Steady at Chicago.

TORONTO LIVE STOCK. Toronto, Sept. 4.—Receipts of live stock at the city cattle market since last Friday, as reported by the railways, were 68 car loads, composed of 753 cattle, 370 hogs, 1363 sheep and lambs, with 185 calves.

Following are the quotations: Best feeders, 800 to 1100 lbs., at \$3.00 to \$4; best feeders, 600 to 800 lbs., at \$3.40 to \$3.65; best stockers, 600 to 800 lbs., at \$2.75 to \$2.95; common stockers, 600 to 900 lbs., at \$2.25 to \$2.50.

VEAL CALVES. The demand for veal calves was good, with prices firm for all of choice quality. Prices ranged from \$3 to \$7.50 per cwt.

SHEEP AND LAMBS. Sheep and lambs were easier in price. Cables for export sheep came lower.

HOGS. The run of hogs was light, but prices remained steady. Last Friday's quotations, Mr. Harris was paying \$6.40 for select and \$6.15 for lights and fats.
