A BACKWARD STEP.
It is not plain sailing with the Whitney Government. Promises made are not being fulfilled and pledges entered into are being disavowed or brazenly ignored. The Weekly Sun speaking on this subject says:

The interview between representatives of the Farmers' Association and members of the Ontario Government held last week was not so satisfactory—in one important particular—as were some of the interviews of like nature previously held. Speaking on former occasions, in response to statements similar to those made on behalf of organized agriculture last week, Mr. Whitney declared himself as emphatically opposed to the principle of subsidizing railways. He did not go so far, even on these other occasions, as to declare that he would not be party to subsidy-granting under any conceivable circumstances; but he did say he was distinctly opposed to the system as a general principle.

At last week's interview, Mr. Cochrane, who was the principal speaker on behalf of the Government, announced himself in terms almost as positive in favor of the policy of subsidy-granting. New Ontario, he said, in effect, must be opened up by railways, and railway building can be secured only by means of subsidies, because the Province cannot borrow the money to build a public enterprise all the lines needed, and private capital will not undertake the work without public aid.

In speaking on the subject of bounties, Mr. Cochrane took an equally unsatisfactory position. He declared if he were to adopt the principle of compelling the payment of a tax, or in the form of royalty, on mineral output, he would use the revenue so raised to make payments in the form of bounties for the encouragement of a smelting industry in connection with our mineral development.

If Mr. Cochrane speaks for Whitney's cabinet, there has been a change of policy on the part of that Cabinet, and this fact cannot be too soon recognized. There is, however, another new and important fact, the full bearing of which calls for clear recognition. Ten years ago the mineral industry was of almost no account in Ontario. To-day this industry is sufficiently well organized to have as its spokesman in the Cabinet one of the strong men in the Ministry. Every passing day furnishes additional evidence of the im-

perative need of the maintenance of an active and aggressive farmers' organization if agriculture is to maintain its due share of influence in directing the course of public affairs.

EDITORIAL NOTES.
The United States exported last year over \$400,000,000 of cotton, more than the value of all the exports of foodstuffs and provisions. Of the amount Great Britain took \$177,000,000, being the best customer by about \$75,000,000.
