THE KIRKFIELD MURDER CASE

WAS TAKEN UP AT THE ASSIZES TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

Chief Justice Mayne Presided—Jury Brought in True Bill. From Evening Post of Sept. 25. Chief Justice Mayne, of Toronto, presided at the fall assizes to-day. There was a number of cases on the list, but all have been settled except the Kirkfield murder case, which came up this afternoon, Court opening at 1.30 o'clock, with Mr. F. E. Hodgins, K.C. of Toronto, and Mr. A. P. Davlin, Lindsay, for the Crown, and Mr. T. G. Robinson, K.C. for the prisoner.

Judge McMillan has adjourned his division court at Woodville to-day, and will preside at the County Court in Lindsay instead. The chief case is Robinson vs. Blackwell, in which Robinson is suing the defendant for \$200 damages for injuries received. It will be remembered that when the case came up some time ago before Police Magistrate Jackson, Blackwell was simply fined, but now the ex-Alderman is claiming damages. Messrs. Stewart & O'Connor are acting for Mr. Robinson, and I. E. Weldon for Mr. Blackwell.

Judge McMillan is presiding at Bobcaygeon to-day, over the division court sittings. ADDRESS TO JURORS. Mr. P. J. Hurley, of Lindsay, was appointed foreman of the jury.

Mr. Justice Mayne, in his remarks to the jury, said that while the criminal work to come before the jury, in so far as the number of cases was concerned, was light, yet they had one of a very serious nature. The charge was laid against one William Dillon, who it was said, from appearances, murdered one Miller. He (Judge Mayne) did not intend to deal at any length with the case—the witnesses would detail evidence to the jury, and he reminded the jury that they heard only one side of the case— that of the witness who are called by the Crown. He explained the situation, and told them that if they came to the conclusion that the prisoner should stand trial they could bring in a true bill. He understood there was no eye witness of the deed, but that frequently was the case. The accused man and the murdered man were left alone for a while, and one was found dead at the door with two wounds in his head. Justice Mayne went on to explain a few circumstances as to how things were laid out, and he expressed his trust that the jury had disposed of the criminal charge it would be their duty to inspect the public buildings belonging to the County. It was their function to see that the management of these buildings was being properly carried on and the inmates cared for. It was in their power to make suggestions as to improvements, etc. After a few more remarks the jury withdrew.

Prisoner Dillon pleaded not guilty, and the court adjourned at 3.30 p.m. till to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

BOARD OF TRADE MEETING. Members Met Last Night to Discuss a New Industry. From Evening Post of Sept. 25. A meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade was held last evening in the Waterworks office to deal with a few matters. Those present were President Carew, Secretary Donald, and Messrs. D. Ray, E. J. Lytle, J. M. McLennan, A. Horn, Jos. Staples, R. Kyrie, D. Cinnamon, Aid. O'Reilly, and I. E. Weldon.

After the minutes and several communications had been dealt with, Secretary Donald called attention to an offer made by a Toronto manufacturer to remove his business to Lindsay in consideration of a loan of \$5000, to be repaid in instalments. He would employ 30 to 40 hands, principally women and girls. The machinery in use would be worth \$2,500. The members did not regard the offer in a very favorable light, but finally it was moved by Messrs. Kyrie and Carey that the promoter be asked to visit Lindsay and meet the Board of Trade in connection with the matter. The Council then adjourned.

CHARGED WITH SERIOUS OFFENCE. Galway Township Man Attempted to Assault a Woman. Oliver Barr, of Galway township, near Kimmuton, was brought to Peterboro Wednesday afternoon, having been arrested by County Constable Archie Moore, charged with having committed an indecent assault on Florence Peters, a married lady living in the same district. The assault is alleged to have taken place last Friday. Mrs. Peters' husband was in Kimmuton at the time and his wife was alone on the farm. She was out in the field digging potatoes when Barr is said to have come out of a nearby woods and made the assault. The woman fought him off with the hoe and prevented him from accomplishing his purpose. The affair has aroused great excitement in the neighborhood.

FROM LONDON TO HONG KONG IN LESS THAN THIRTY DAYS. "Overseas Mail" Fast Service Well Inside the Schedule Limit.

Montreal, Que., Sept. 24. C. P. R. Empress of China arrived at Hong Kong at 9 a.m., yesterday, delivering the mails from Great Britain in 29 days, 7 hours and 35 minutes, or four hours and 25 minutes within the time allowed by the post office.

This successful inauguration of the fast mail service between Liverpool and Hong Kong under the flag of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company is particularly gratifying, as the entire half circuit of the globe having been made without a hitch or without interfering with the ordinary routine work of the road.
