AGED CLERGYMAN HONORED

REV. MR. ROBERTS WITH PURSE AND AN ADDRESS On the Eve of his Departure for Cobourg to Reside. From Evening Post of Sept. 20. A large gathering of members of the Cambridge-st. Methodist church congregation assembled in the basement of the church last night to bid good-bye to Rev. E. E. Roberts, who is about to move to Cobourg to reside. It is just six years ago last spring that Rev. Mr. Roberts retired from the ministry as supernumerary clergyman at Onemee, and moved to Lindsay. In those six years he has endeared himself to a large circle of friends, and has been commonly alluded to as "The Grand Old Man." And such he is in every sense of the term—always willing to help others, and kind to those who needed comfort. He frequently supplied the pulpit of the Cambridge-st. church and also Queen-st. during the absence of the pastors, and even though retired from active ministry, he always kept up an interest in the church's religious functions, being a regular class leader until quite recently, when his health began to fail him. Old and young regard him as a true friend and christian, and say good-bye with regret. Last evening Rev. Roberts was presented with a well-filled purse and the following address: To Rev. E. Roberts, from the congregation of Cambridge-st. Methodist church, Lindsay. Dear Brother Roberts—The members of this congregation, having with regret, that you are about to remove from Lindsay to another town, take this opportunity to express our appreciation of your worth and character, both as a citizen and as a minister of the gospel, and in deep appreciation of the relations of life. You came among us when advancing years obliged you to resign the active work of the ministry and assume a less active relation to the church, and since coming in our midst, all the members of the church, and in the measure of grace, and in every way trying to hold up the hands and second the efforts of the pastor in charge, and all this done with the happy, genial smile so familiar to us all. Lindsay has been fortunate in the possession of a few christian gentlemen, retired ministers of the gospel, whose pure lives, ripened experience, and matured christian graces up to an advanced age, have been an honor and a blessing to this community. We pray that God will multiply amongst us men of truth and sincerity and loyalty to conviction. We are sorry that circumstances have made it unavoidable that we should, in your loss such an influence from our midst, and we ask that you will accept this small token of our regard and esteem, praying that God's richest blessing may rest upon you, and accompany you, Brother Roberts, and your family, to your new home, and that these, your later years, may be spent in the "beulah land" of christian experience and that while having answered the call of God to go out into the world and preach the gospel and having been sustained and comforted by the promise, "Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end." You may at the last be able to say with Paul, in his letter to Timothy, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith; henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness which the Lord, the Righteous Judge shall give me at that day, and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing." And may we all hopefully look for and love his appearing. We commend you, dear brother, and your family, to the care of our Heavenly Father. RECORD PRICE FOR CHEESE THE C.P.R. OVERSEAS MAIL 10c Cigars

CHEESE SOLD LAST FRIDAY FOR 13 1-4c. PER POUND. Highest Price Ever Paid For Cheese in Lindsay—Almost a Quarter Greater Than Peterboro. On Friday the highest prices ever offered for cheese on the Lindsay Cheese Board was offered by Buyers Cook, Kerr and Flavell, when the whole Board, comprising 1314 boxes, sold at 13 1-4 cents. This offer is one of the highest in the cheese history and speaks well for the Victoria County cheese. It is beyond the sale of last Wednesday at Peterboro when cheese sold at 13 1-8c. The factories who boarded were: Star 88, Cameron 90, Dumfries 102, Mariposa 90, Cambridge 72, Onemee 180, North Verulam 119, North Ops 110, Reabrook 110, Bobcaygeon 169, Red Rock 148, North Harvey 55. Before commencing the bidding it was agreed to hold the next sale on October 5th. President Robertson referred to the high price of cheese sold on the market to-day (Friday). They expected over 13 cents, which would be the highest price he ever got for cheese. THE BIDDING. The bidding was spirited. Mr. W. Flavell started the call at 13 cents, Mr. Gillespie raising to 13 1-16c, and Mr. Cook to 13 1-8c. Buyer Gillespie then bid 13 1-8c, for the board, but Mr. Cook was not to be outdone, and offered 13 1-16c for the board. Mr. Kerr then bid 13 1-4c, for selections, which President Robertson said was a quarter higher than he expected. Mr. Kerr then called for the balance of the Board. The latter refusing, preferring to wait for Mr. Flavell's call. Mr. Kerr offered 3-16c. for further, but Messrs. Cook and Brown both called a 1-4c. Mr. Cook making his bid for the balance of the Board. He called Star, Cameron, Dumfries, Mariposa, Cambridge, Onemee, North Verulam, North Ops, Bobcaygeon and Maple Leaf. Mr. Flavell secured Reabrook, Bobcaygeon and North Harvey. The Board then adjourned. Church of England Hymnal [The secretary of the Compilation Committee, Mr. J. Edmund Jones, has notified Mr. J. H. Knight that the committee has accepted for the new hymnal two tunes composed by the latter, one called Lindsay, for the hymn, "Through the Day Thy Love has spared us," the other called Verulam, for "Brightest and Best of the Sons of the Morning."

RECORD TIME OF THE EMPRESS OF INDIA DESPITE STORMS.

Departure of First "Overseas" Mail Train From Vancouver. Kenora, Ont., Sept. 20. Within forty-eight hours from the mountains of British Columbia, the cattle ranches of Alberta and the broad wheat belts of Saskatchewan and Manitoba, have been travelled by the "Overseas Mail" a distance of over 1600 miles, and now in this Ontario town the train, which is a great factor in bringing London and Hong Kong nearer together, is ready to pull out on scheduled time. The fact that this magnificent train has made the continuous run in itself a tribute to the management of the C.P.R. for its speeding has not disturbed the ordinary business of the road. A more glorious September day than this could hardly have been imagined, a fair one could not be desired. The sun shone brightly and generally was only at times obscured by the smoke of the scores of grain threshers which were making ready for market the golden grain of the Canadian West. Winnipeg was reached at 4:30, and 20 minutes later the "Overseas Mail" sped across the Red River of the north, through the great Province of Ontario, through which its course runs until the banks of the St. Lawrence are neared. There were quite a number of people to greet the arrival of the train at Winnipeg, as there have been at different points along the line, at which stops were made. C.P.R. CO'S FAST TRAIN CROSSED CONTINENT IN 88 HOURS. Empress of Britain Left Quebec one Hour Ahead of Schedule. Quebec, Que., Sept. 21st. "The Overseas Mail" train reached here this afternoon two hours ahead of its scheduled time, and an hour later the Canadian Pacific Steamship Empress of Britain was on her way down the St. Lawrence, bound for Liverpool. The "Overseas" train left Vancouver Monday night at 7 o'clock, six hours behind its schedule and having crossed the continent in 88 hours, allowing three hours for the difference in the time, or at an average speed of 35 miles an hour. This is a long distance record for an unbroken trip by one continuous train. The distance to be covered under the new mail contract is over 12,000 miles, and three-fourths of the mileage has been made sharp on time, leaving the Empress of Britain fairly on her way to land the
