

GARRISON OF ALLIES.

Strength of the Forces Which Will Hold Peking.

THE UNITED STATES DROPS OUT

Japanese, Germans, Russians and British Will Compose the Garrison that Will Winter in the Chinese Capital—Li Hung Chang Says that Pao Ting Fu Will Surrender Without Opposition.

Peking, Oct. 9.—Gen. Yamaguchi will retain 10,000 Japanese troops, 2,000 of them at Peking, and the others at Taku and along the line of communication.

Britain Is With Germany. Berlin, Oct. 11.—Great Britain's answer to Germany's second note was received in London this morning.

Count Von Waldersee's headquarters will be the buildings in the Imperial pleasure grounds outside the purple city.

Daily Becoming More Gloomy. London, Oct. 9.—The Shanghai correspondent of The Times, writing Oct. 7, says: "It is expected that the French troops hold Lu Ko Chiao on the Lu Han Railroad."

Expedition For Pao Ting Fu. Tien Tsin, Oct. 9.—The expedition for Pao Ting Fu has been fixed for Friday next.

For the Defence of Shanghai. Shanghai, Oct. 10.—Great excitement was caused here this morning by the concourse of troops and volunteers from all points of the compass.

Tuan to be Punished. Three Other Officials Will be Decapitated and Three Imprisoned For Life to Appease Germany.

Peking, Sunday, Oct. 7, via Tien Tsin, Oct. 8, and Shanghai, Oct. 9.—A response to the German demands has been transmitted to Li Hung Chang.

Yankee Troops Out of It. Peking, Oct. 4, via Tien Tsin, Sunday, Oct. 7, and Shanghai, Oct. 8.—The American troops will not participate in the expedition to Pao Ting Fu.

The first reinforcements of German troops have arrived here. They divided the forts.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 9.—Admiral Alexieff, in reporting the occupation of Shan Hai Kuan, on the Gulf of Liao Tung, says:

The town has not been occupied, but the gates are guarded by artillery. The forts are nearly intact, and the whole route from Pong Ken to Shan Kuan is now occupied by the Russians.

Shields and His Men Rescued. Manila, Oct. 15.—Captain Devereaux Shields, who with 31 men of Co. F, 29th Regiment, U.S. Volunteer Infantry, was captured by the insurgents last month in the island of Marikina, was rescued yesterday with all the members of his party.

THREATENED REVOLUTION.

The Outlook in the Southern Provinces of China is Not Promising—Germany and Japan.

Berlin, Oct. 13.—A despatch received here yesterday from Shanghai says a very serious view is taken of the situation in the southern provinces of China.

Province Threatened With the Greatest in China's History.

Excitement at Hong Kong. Bombay Infantry Has Been Ordered to Be in Readiness to Move to the Frontier on Two Hours' Notice—Lasting Peace Considered Improbable Unless Kwang Su Will Return to Peking.

Shanghai, Oct. 11.—Sheng, the taotai, has received a telegram from Gen. Su, reporting that a serious situation is broken out in the southern western part of Kwang Province, and that his 30,000 troops are inadequate, and he needs at least 100,000 to cope with the danger which is directed against the Manchus and the Taipings.

Boxers Forming Great Armies. Moscow, Oct. 12.—A despatch from Peking says that the rebels are forming new and large bodies of troops in southern China, and that a fearful outbreak in the Province of Szechuan is inevitable.

Lasting Peace Improbable. Berlin, Oct. 12.—Count Von Waldersee, an official telegram announces, will start for Peking from Tien Tsin next Saturday.

An Important Development. Berlin, Oct. 13.—The proposal of the Russian Government that in case of protracted divergence of views regarding equitable indemnities, this matter might be commended to the consideration of the international Court of Arbitration at The Hague, is regarded as the most important development of the Chinese situation.

Aimed at the Manchurians. Hong Kong, Oct. 11.—The rebellion which has broken out in Kwangtung, is believed to be directed against the Manchurians, and not against the foreigners, since the missions were not molested.

Excitement at Hong Kong. Bombay Infantry Ordered to Be in Readiness to Move at Once. Hon. Kong, Oct. 11.—Admiral Ho, with two hundred troops, has arrived at Sanchun (Sanchui) from Canton.

The Advance to Pao Ting Fu. Tien Tsin, Oct. 9.—Gen. Von Waldersee, commanding the allied forces, has assumed the command of the expedition to depart on the 11th.
