54 Missionaries Were Murdered.

New York, Oct. 10 .- A complete list of Protestant missionaries known to have been killed from the beginning of the Bover movement to Sept. 5 has been received by the American Bible Society from Rev. John R. Hykes, D. D., its agent at Shanghai. They number 54. Besides these, there are named 124 others, very few, if any, of whom will escape. Of these, 66 are men, 73 women (41 married and 32 single), and 39 children.

10,000 FRENCH DESERTERS.

The force will leave Tien Tsin, and will connect near Pao Ting Fu with a column of the same strength from Pekin, under command of General Gaselee. Four battalions of French troops which left Yangtsun on Oct. 4 on an independent expedition have been halted and ordered to await the arrival of the main force. THE SITUATION IN CHINA.

The News Received at the British Foreign Office on Saturdry . as More Sat.s. Letory Luan Uscal.

London, Oct. 15 .-- There is reason to believe that the British Foreign Office received satisfactory news from Pekin on Saturday, indicating the early return of the Emperor and his court to the capital, while the Emress-Dowager remains at Singan Fu. If this reference is correct, it means also that the Emperor has plucked up courage, with the assistince of the streng men of his court to arrest Prince Tuan and drag him to Pekin for public execution. If the powers secure Prince Tuan's head, they will not be unduly curious as to the accomplices in the massacres, for all are more or less apprehensive of the consequences which might result from an undue prolongation of the crisis. All, too, are saturated with the knowledge that the Chinese hedgehog is a remarkably prickly thing to tackle. There will be little trouble over the question of indemnity.
