Wonderful Things Accomplished in Four Short Years.

TELLING ADDRESSES BY MR GEO M HUGH AND OTHERS.

The Academy Packed to the Doors-Many Conservatives in the Audience -Convincing Reasons why the Liberal Government Should be Returned to Power in Order to Complete their Plans for Trade Development and Lasting Prosperity.

One of the most enthusiastic political meetings ever held in Lindsay was that of Thursday, when the Hon. Wm. Mulock, Minister of Labor and Postmester-General of Canada, spoke in the interests of Mr. George Mc-Hugh, the popular liberal candidate. The Academy of Music was filled to the attentive audience, composed of al classes of citizens, who were anxious to hear the man who has done se much to improve the condition of our laboring classes, and who has given the people a cheaper postal rate and a uniformly better marl service.
