Winnipeg, Sept. 27.-Winnipeg yesterday participated in a demonstration unique in its history. Her citizens in tens of thousands lined, the streets, and with enthusiastic loyalty cheered the future King and Queen of the British Empire. From the C. P. R. station to Government House, the procession was one continuous ovation. In the brilliant sunlight of a Manitoba autumn, with flags duttering gaily from every staff, and bunting of the national colors, draped and festooned everywhere. The weather, upon which the success of an out-of-door demonstration depends in so great a degree, was all athat could be desired.

The route of the procession was early crowded with pedestrians commenting on the decorations and marking the various stages of preparation for parade. By 11 o'clock everything was in readiness, and public expectation was high. Punctually on time the Vice-Regal train pulled in and His Honor and party awaited in the marquee the arrival of the Duke and Duchess, occupying the interval in being introduced to and chatting with the gentlemen having charge of the reception.

The arrival of the royal train was the signal for an outbreak of cheering from the thousands without the barriers; a cheer that was repeated and re-echoed all along the route. Winnipeggers knew that royalty had entered their gates. The acclamations burst out afresh as the royal party drove to the City Hall, in front of which were formed the veterans of the Transvaai, who under other skies had worthily upheld Canadian valor and Imperial unity. These were presented with the medals they had won on African veldt and kopje. His Royal Highness saying a few words to each; words that will long be remembered and cherished by those to whom they were ad-

The citizens of Winnipeg, through their civic officials, then presented a loyal address, to which His Royal Highness gave a simple and suitable reply, which among others contained these paragraphs:

"During the long and memorable jourmey to the extreme eastern and from thence to the far western limit of our wast Empire, we have seen everywhere many and varied proofs of its steady but certain progress, material and political, but I doubt whether in the whole course of that experience a more striking example is to be found than in the comparison of the Fort Garry of our childhood with the Winnipeg of to-day.

"Then, as you say, 'A village hamlet an a solitude,' broken only by the presence of 'the passing hunter and fur trader,' to-day the busy centre of what has become the great granary of the Empire, the political centre of an active and enterprising population in the full enjoyment of the privileges and instientlons of British citizenship.

Good Advice in Reference to Political Organization and Discussion Given to the Liberal Association by the Central Organization-Prelimininary Preparation Essential-

Toronto, Sept. 26.-Ever since his return from Great Britain Premier Ross has been in receipt of advices from all sections of the Province assuring him of the splendid work nccomplished on the revision of the voters' lists. Never before on behalf of the Liberals has so much attention been given to this important phase of an election contest. There are yet a number of voters' list courts to be held, and the workers canstituencies report that these also will receive the closest attention possible, while special regard will be paid the lists wherever the Opposition urged "good work" to be done, as their instructions directed, by the "sound Conservative assessors" and the "clerks who are

This year the Liberals are fortunate in having attended to the lists in each step of the work, viz., (1) in supplying names to the assessors, with the creation of the Duke of sent rate of expenditure until the clerk of the weather ought to be conappealing to the Judge's Court to add names improperly omitted, and striking off names wrongfully inserted. 
