our best known and most highly respected citizens. He had been a resident of Lindsay for over thirtythree years, coming here from Kingston with his mother, two sisters and an uncle. Previous to coming to Kingstor they lived in County Antrim, Ireland, After residing in Lindsay a short time his uncle, the late Edward White, engaged is the carriage business, and the deceased worked with him. Some time later deceased went to the North-west where he gained considerable knowledge about architectural work under a builder named Calvert. After remaining several years in the West he returned to Lirdsay and started in business for himself as an architact and contractor. He erected many hardsome buildings in the last fifteen years, the Academy of Music being one of his first contracts. In politics deceased was a staunch Reference, and in religion a Presbyterian, He is a member of Lindsay Lodge No. 100, LO.O.F., and several other societies.
