The agricultural fair of Galway township, held at Kinmount on Friday last, was in point of attendance one of the most successful in the history of the township. The day was ideal in every respect and the grounds in perfect condition, and the management of the fair was most successful.

A special train left town at 9 a.m. on the morning of the fair and picked up a large number of passengers at the different stations along the line.

Of fruits and vegetables it might be said that whilst most of the exhibits were of the ordinary kind, there were on the whole of fine quality. Apples were shown in great quantities, and of fine quality.

In stock the exhibits showed a considerable falling off, excepting in those which were hard to come by. In the driving class the animals were the equal of those shown at many of the leading fairs.
