HEARD TWO GRAND SERMONS SUNDAY.

Rev. Solomon Cleaver of Sherburne-st. Toronto, the Speaker. The Rev. Solomon Cleaver, of Toronto, occupied the pulpit of the Cambridge-st. Methodist church on Sunday, and was greeted by a large congregation, especially in the evening, when the church was packed.

Mr. Cleaver in the morning spoke to his audience on the passage, "Not by might, nor by power, but by the spirit, saith the Lord of hosts," Zechariah, 4th chapter, 6th verse. Dr. Cleaver explained how it was that we have got to have the spirit of the Lord God, and not a power, in order to be called great. He gave examples to show how great kings had tried to get along without the spirit of Christ, but failed and were overthrown. After the temple of Jerusalem had been rebuilt by the king, the people and he king alike feared the Lord. How easy we forget that it was not God's truth, it is marvelous the way we forget the things we ought to remember to look back to the time of King Saul, the giant who towered head and shoulders above his army. He seemed to be cut out as a King and ruler of men, but before the great truth he was about to fight he trembled because "it is not might, nor by power, but by spirit," said the Lord. King Saul had rejected God, and now he dreaded the conflict with the enemy, because God's spirit was not with them. Does the truth of the text prevail today as of yore? Yes, turn to the book of Acts in the New Testament, and you read how the little company in the upper room of Jerusalem, waited and waited, and what they waited for, he said, "they were waiting for the outpouring of the spirit of God." When it came they crowded out into the streets of Jerusalem and proclaimed the gospel of the old story of God's love, that "it was not by might, etc."

The church finally began to forget the text and the promise of a spirit of degradation. Martin Luther came forward and proclaimed the gospel anew, and as a result we had the reformation. First in the west, then in England and then in America. Now the Wesleyan came forth, and again the people were led on to seek for the old story of God's love, that "it was not by might, etc."

THE HOME FOR THE AGED.

ANNUAL MEETING AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

Interesting Statistics Given in the Annual Report Read by the Secretary. The annual meeting of the Home for the Aged Society was held in the Council chamber on Friday, Oct. 14th, with the following members present: Mrs. Grandin, Mrs. Milne, Mrs. Traub, Mrs. Cairns, Mrs. Weldon, Mrs. Stinson, Mrs. Mills, Mrs. Sharpe, and Messrs. Kelly, McGuffey and Chief Neilson, with Ald. McWaters in the chair. The minutes of last annual meeting were read and confirmed.

Fundry Matters.

The following reports were read and adopted: Treasurer's yearly report, the Home Dispensary's report, the yearly reports of the east ward dispensary and dispensary in east division of south ward, and the Board of Management.

The election of officers for the ensuing year resulted as follows: President, Mr. Thos. Stewart; 1st Vice-President, Mr. Ald. McWaters; 2nd Vice-President, Mr. J. Connolly; Secretary, Mrs. E. Sharpe; Treasurer, Miss Mrs. C. S. Stewart, M. W. S. Stewart; Council: Mrs. Weldon, Mrs. Milne, Mrs. Abbott, Mrs. Traub, Mrs. Cairns, Mrs. Weldon, Mrs. Stinson, Mrs. Mills, Mrs. Sharpe, Kelly, McGuffey, Neilson, Macdonald, Ferguson, Macdonald, Wallace, Trimann, Robinson; Honorary members, Ald. McWaters, Miss Twamley.

The motion Mrs. Sharpe, the secretary, was allowed an increase of \$10 in salary.

Annual Report.

The annual report of the Management stated that the prospects of a larger and better home had not intervened with the present Home. Close attention had been given to the requirements and comfort of the inmates. The routine of the Home is similar to past years—there are the times for eating, for differences, occasional aches, sickness, but on the whole all have enjoyed fairly good health.

The assistant matron, who was seriously ill for a short period, was taken to the hospital and soon recovered. Her inmates were discharged for disregard of the Home rules. An inmate who was considerably unwell a charge was removed, Miss Cameron, who had been satisfactorily filled that position since her mother's death, tendered her resignation in August. Three applications for the position were received, but none of them was accepted. Mrs. H. G. Whiteside had been engaged as matron at a salary of \$15 per month. The assistant matron, Miss Cameron, who had been satisfactorily filled that position since her mother's death, tendered her resignation in August.

The number of inmates in the Home on Oct. 1st, 1908, was 41, namely: discharged during the year, 4; number leaving from choice, 2; death in the Home, 1; largest number recorded, 23; smallest, 18; number of males in Home, 17; females 5; Roman Catholics 6; Protestants 11; Canadian 12; Irish 11; Scotch, 2; English 1. Admission of individuals, 10; country wards, 5; town wards, 7; Ops. 2; Emoryville, 1; self-sustaining inmates, 8.

The donations to the Home are not so numerous as formerly, but a number of useful and valuable gifts have been received during the year.
