People were shocked by the unpleasant discovery that under our much vaunted Canadian banking system, pronounced by financiers to be the best under the sun, it seemed to be easily possible for a trusted but unscrupulous bank servant to equal, if not excel, the record of Banker Stensland, of Cnicago, Canadians generally have felt that such doings were well night impossible on this side of the line owing to the excellent safeguards surrounding banking operations in Canada, hence the jolt administered by the discovery of McGill's bold and long
