Notes by Mr. Wm. Hunt, Ontario Agricultural Society At the request of the Guelph Hor-

tleultural Society the following short notes on "Bulb Culture", have been prepared by Mr. Wm. Hunt, Ontario Agricultural College. These notes are furnished with bulbs given to scholars of Guelph schools by the Society, as premiums in geranium growing competition.

Dutch hyacinths- These hyacinths

are best adapted for pot or window culture as they are scarcely hardy when planted out of doors. Use loamy potting soil, or good garden soil. If earth from the garden is used, mix about one-fifth part of fine sharp sand with the earth. Plant the bulb so that the top of the bulb is about half an inch below the top of the pot. Press the soil fairly firm around the bulbs. Water them well, once, so as to moisten all the soil in the pot or box. The top of the bulb should be only just below the surface of the soil, when potted The surface of the soil should be about half an inch below the rim of the pot to allow space for water. They propose running their main transmission line down to Campbellford, four miles south, and on to Brighton, diverging west to Colborne, Cobourg and Port Hope and east to Trenton and Belleville. They intend uniting other Trent river powers, and at the present time Mr. Culverwell has secured by deed several portions of the different water powers near Campbellford.

Belleville can expect in the near future to be connected with a transmission line with thirty thousand horse power, connected at the intial
