THE NORTH-WESTERN SECTION.

The Busy Villages of Dauphin and Minnedosa-The Duck and Riding Mountains-Doukhobors in the Swan River Valley - Game Abundant in all Parts.

In April last Messrs. Gross and Nosworthy left town to spend the summer with the Dickson surveying party in Manitoba. They arrived in Winnipeg on Sunday, April 29th, and spent a couple of days there viewing the sights of the Prairie City, which greatly impressed them. On the following Tuesday morning they boarded the Brandon express, (C.P.R.), arriving at Portage La Prairie shortly before noen. this point Mr. Jas. Dickson, of Fenelon Falls, with a couple of other members of the party, joined the boys, and after transferring to the Canadian Northern Railway (Mckenzie & Monn's new line) they journeyed to

The Village of Dauphin

is a new place scarcely three years old, and is one of the busiest towns in the West, being situated in the centre of a very rich farming country. From Dauphin a spur line of the Canadian Northern runs out to the Gilbert Plains, which are situated between the Riding and Duck Mountains, wheat. Mr. T. A. Burrows, M.P.P., a nephew of Dr. Burrows, town, is one of the leading influential citizens of ing a block of buildings in Duaphin which will cost in the neighborhood

On the 3rd of May the party, in number, started out from Dauphin to survey a township in the Clan William municipality, about 16 miles north of the town of Minnedosa. The trip was made through ? Ridin Mountains, via the Neepawa ...au, with wagons and horses, and on account of the very bad roads and other draw backs a week elapsed before th party reached their destination.

The Riding Mountains are well wooded, black and white poplar being the prevailing kinds. At the summit of the mountains lies Lake Audy, a beautiful sheet of water, and a few miles away, is McLeod an old stopping place. In the mountains game of all kinds is very plentiful-moose, elk, deer, wolves and bear also ducks, prairie chickens and partridges galore. The township ordered for survey was 17, range 18, and to our great dissatisfaction it turned ou to be a very wet one, being full ponds and lakes; it was thickly timbered, and consequently none of the party escaped sore or wet feet. After completing the work there

they broke camp and through the kindness of Mr. Arch. McDougail, a brother of Mr. Hugh McDougall, of Fencion Falls, they were driven to Minnedosp, town on the Manitoba and North-Western Railway. Township 17, range 18, is chiefly settled by

Swedes and Norwegians, and no better settlers can be found in the country. At Minnedosa the party spent a couple of days in getting new supplies; it is a very busy town, and has many handsome buildings. Mr. Pickering, a wealthy Eng- Co., Brockville, Ont. ishman and banker, is the owner of one of the largest club buildings in Monitoba, and also has a large dog

After leaving Minnedosa the party went to Yorkton, N.W.T., about 150 miles away. Yorkton is at the terminus of the Manitoba and Northprariet Ranching is indulged in on a large scale in that vicinity. This town may claim the credit of having the handsomest school buildings in the Territories. There is a large Hudson's Bay Store and other equally as large business places in the village. From this point the party headed in a northeasterly direction to their work on The Duck Mountains

The distance to the Ducks from Yorkton is about 80 miles, and a very enjoyable week was spent in making the

Crowstand Mission, under the auspices of the Presbyterian church is situated at the entrance to an Indian Reserve, which the party passed through. The Mission is in charge of the Rev. Mr. Gilmore, a former Torontonian. There is also an Indian School in connection, and some good work is being carried on there by the reverend gentleman and his faithful assistants. In passing through the reserve, which is on the east side the Assinaboine river.

Indian Wigwams were seen scattered everywhere and presented a very pretty sight. At Cote, where the Indian Agent resides, Mr. Dickson secured the services of an Indian guide to take us to township 33, ranges 28 and 29, which we had to survey. These townships were much easier to survey on account of being freer of marshes and slews, and also not so thickly timbered.

Game of all kinds is to be had on these mountains, especially ducks, partridges and prairie chickens, which are there by the thousands. There is some good farming country in the mountains, but unfortunately the district is subject to early frosts, therefore ranching seems to be the prevailing occupation.
