THE DISCUSSION PROTRACTED.

Troops Moving Toward the Imperial Tombs-Allies Purging Villages.

Paris, Nov. 3 .- A despatch to the Havas agency from Pekin, dated Oct. 31, says: "The Foreign Ministers continue to-day the discussion of the peace propositions to be presented to the

Chinese. The French proposals were accepted. Additional specifications will be discussed Monday. On account of the necessity for thorough accord between the different Cabinets, the final note will not be presented for several weeks. "Gen. Voyron (commander-in-chief of the French troops in China), with

More Peace Commissioners. London, Nov. 3 .- The Shanghai correspondent of The Times says that an Imperial edict appoints Liu Kun Yi, Viceroy of Nankin, and Chang Chi Tung, Viceroy of Hankow, to be additional peace commissioners on behalf of China.

Three Vital Questions. Washington, Nov. 3 .- It was stated yesterday, in quarters well versed in Chinese affairs, that outside of the questions of indemnity, punishments, etc., now under negotiation at Pekin, there were three vital and far-reaching questions to be determined, viz.: First, the removal of the Empress-Dowager, personally and through the influence of her advisers, from all participation in the Chinese Government; second, the creation of an indemnity fund by the increase of China's customs revenue, either by the payment of the duties in gold instead of depreciated silver as at present, or else by doubling the present silver duties from five per cent. to ten per cent. ad valorem; third, the establishment of a Minister of Foreign Affairs, in place of the old and numbersome system of the Tsung Li

Emperor's Favorite Wife Drowned. Berlin, Nov. 8 .- A special despatch to The Hamburg correspondent says: In a well situated in the Imperial Palace precincts in Pekin was found the body of Emperor Kwang Su's favorite wife, Suenti, whom the Empress Dowager caused to be drowned before the flight of the court from the capital. The second favorite, Shing Fi, and 100 ladies belonging to the Imperial Harem, are prisoners in the hands of the allies.

BATTLE IN CHINA

Angle-German Force of 1,500 Men Under Col Von Norman Stormed the Tzehing Kung Pass.

London, Nov. &-The Pall Mall Gazette this afternoon publishes a despatch from Ichow, dated Oct. 28, which says heavy fighting has occurred in the mountains on the Shan Si frontier. An Anglo-German force of 1500 men, commanded by Col. Von Norman, stormed Tzching Kung Pass. The Chinese occupied a strong position on the crest and stubbornly resisted. They poured a hot enflading fire on the advance party of 80 Germans, under Major Von Forresteer, but the British Bengal Cavalry and Mounted Sappers, dismounting, scaled the heights, turned the enemy's flanks, and relieved the Germans.

Gen. Horne Campbell Working London, Nov. 3.—The following despatch has been received from Gen. Horne Campbell by the Secretary of State for India, Lord George Hamilton: "Arrived at Ronshu Oct. 31 from Pao Ting Fu. Took a circuitous route, destroyed four large Boxer entrenchments and a large amount of arms and ammunition: can-Col. Retallick, commanding the river column, captured nine armed junks at Baou Pei Kou."

Count Von Waldersee Confirms It. Berlin, Nov. & Field Marshal Count von War Office, confirms the report of fighting between an Anglo-German force and chinese (referred to in a special despatch printed by The London Pall Mall Gazette and in a special despatch received in Berat the great wall, but after a hot fight the gate was stormed and five guns were captured. MINERS KILLED.

Frightful Explosion in the Southern Coal and Transportation Company's Mines at Berryburg, Va.

Philippi, W. Va., Nov. 5 .- At 1.30 o'clock Saturday morning a terrific explosion occurred at the Southern Coal and Transportation Company's mines at Berrysburg, six miles from Philippi. -Twelve dead bodies have been taken from the mines. It occurred in the second left No. 6 room, south entrance. The mine owners refuse to discuss it, saying it was caused by too heavy a charge of powder being used. The miners say it was caused by fire damp. Men are busy removing the dead from the mines, as at this time it is extremely dangerous. Work is slow. So far the following have been taken
