Specimens of the Kind of Letters

Appearing in American Journals. Below we print a couple of letters taken from the Philadelphia Press, forwarded by Mr. Bert Mimms, formerly of The Post staff, and now in the engineering department of the Baldwin Locomotive Works in that city. Mr. Mimms adds a well known fact that many American papers appear to devote gladly any amount of space to the vilification of Canada and things Canadian, notwithstanding that the library of every well ap-

pointed office contains reliable formation to disprove the ridiculousassertions advanced. The editors might, for instance, ponder the statement of so emigent a statistican Sir Robt. Griffin that Canada wealthier per head than eiither Britain or the United States. His figures show that were Canada's wealth divided, each inhabitant would have \$240. Britain per head can only show \$210, while the States wealth averages but \$175 an individual.

In plain language this means that Canadiana as a rule live in better houses, eat better food, wear better clothes, have more pocket money and more of all comfort that money can buy than either the people of Great Britain or the American republic. And the comparison is more in favour of Canada than the figures show. for in both Britain and the United States there are vast fortunes hoarded by the few, which go to increase the apparent general average. In Canada the millionaires can almost be counted on the fingers of both hands. Canada's wealth is divided more evenly than that of most other nations.

#### In the Wilderness of Canada. (To the Editor of "The Press.")

Sir.-I noticed a communication in your paper about mistakes of corporations supposedly in connection with some summer outing experiences of a correspondent.

I would like to call attention to the fact that if you want to go in for blunders and mistakes just try the so-called "grand tour of Canadian cities and the Lakes." If you want bad service, misinformation and general provincial sloppiness you will find it in Canada.

In fact after having done the "grand tour of the Canadian cities and Lakes" myself I can't help laughing when I see some distinguished foreigners, usually Englishmen, being roped in to do it and evidently expecting to find the same kind of accommodations and experiences as if he travelled to Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington

and Chicago. Really we Americans don't realize how uncivilized and primitive a place Canada is. There are really no great cities in Canada, or no great centers of population. Montreal is a closely built, small city that has not gotten over the characteristics of a country town, and a very bucolic one at that, and, of course, is the biggest and

most boastful city in Canada. But you don't even have to go far from Montreal to get into the wilderness, and that is the peculiar thing about Canada. It is really, to-day, a country in which a sparse population is scattered along its southern border, with little real conquest of its wilds. Its railroad service, aside from a very limited express But you don't even have to go far aside from a very limited express service, which is forced to be up to date by reason of American competi-

tion, is hardly worth talking about. Since I have been to Canada it has been borne in upon me that one of the principal reasons for the boom and collapse of the Consolidated Lake Superior Company was due to American ignorance about Canadian conditions. What was attempted at the Soo was to set up a complex, fullfledged industrial community in a wilderness which was absolutely unprepared for any such sudden devel-

opment. Owing to this American ignorance it is easy for Canadians who have different standards to beguile us, because what is a "great place" to a Canadian or a very advanced community may seem to an American when he sees it to be little removed from the savage conditions of the

Save for hunting and fishing. Americans at present had better beware of the Canadian wilderness, and if you take the "grand tour" you shouldn't expect too much, for if you do you will be disappointed, as railroads and hotel people everywhere will conspire to give you false impressions of what you can get "further on." 
