ALDERMEN ON THE POLICE COURT FIASCO

Mayor Sootheran Was Absent, but the Members Did Not Hesitate to Attack the Failure of Justice Case, and Strong Language Was Used—The Police Commissioners Concerned in the Outcome—Ald. McGree, Chairman of the Police Committee, Authorized to Instruct Chief Nevison to do his Duty and Lay an Information Against Messrs. Steers and Hopkins.

"Now, gentlemen, about this disgusting performance in the police court last week. It is our duty to do something. I instructed the Chief of Police to lay an information against the parties if there was proper grounds, but I understand he has not yet done so."
Above words were uttered Monday evening by Alderman J. McGree, chairman of the Police committee of Lindsay Council, at a meeting of committees held in the Town Clerk's office. The matter had been introduced at an earlier stage of the proceedings by Ald. O'Reilly, who inquired—"Mr. Chairman, how is it the police don't take steps to stamp out scrapping and rowdism?"
To this Ald. McGree replied, "I'm going to bring that matter up."
Ald. Cinnamon—"The question for us to consider is if two ordinary citizens acted in that way what would be done with them?"
Ald. O'Reilly—"They would be fined \$20 each."
Ald. McGree—"And perhaps be sent down for ten days."
Ald. Robinson—"I don't think we have any power to act."
Ald. O'Reilly—"Yes, we have; we are sitting now at a police committee, and we could take away the power of the Police Commissioners at any time we may choose to do so. If they don't press for justice in this case we may have to take action along that line."
Ald. Robinson—"I contend that we have no power over the police force. This thing took place, and if after a reasonable time he fails to lay an information, I can't see how we can interfere."
Ald. O'Reilly—"Did you read The Post to-night?"
Ald. Robinson—"I didn't."
Ald. O'Reilly—"Well, it says in the course of an interview that County Magistrate Deacon informed his reporter that he instructed the Chief of Police to lay an information against the parties, and the Chief informed him that he had received orders not to do so from the Chief Magistrate."
Ald. Cinnamon—"And who is Chief Magistrate?"
Ald. O'Reilly—"The Mayor."
Ald. Storer—"I think we should take some action. Suppose two ordinary citizens are brought up for assault and fined—they will say, 'I only kicked a man, as a lawyer did in this court a short time ago.'"
Ald. Maunder—"I think we ought to take action."
Ald. O'Reilly—"Certainly we should!"
Ald. McGree—"All men should be treated alike. We want the same laws administered to all."
Ald. Cinnamon—"If two ordinary citizens acted in that way what would be the result?"
Ald. Storer—"They would be convicted of contempt of court."
Ald. Cinnamon—"Yes, and if I had my way I would put both of them in gaol for six months."
Moved by Ald. O'Reilly, seconded by Ald. Storer, that the chairman of the Police and Licensing Committee be authorized to instruct Chief of Police Nevison to lay an information against the principals in the recent police court assault case. "Carried unanimously," declared Chairman McGree, and no voice was raised in protest.

Early Closing Defeated.
In police committee, Ald. McGree in the chair, Ald. Cinnamon pressed for action in accordance with the request of the hardware men's petition that it be made compulsory on them to close at 7 o'clock the year round, Saturday's and the evening before holidays excepted. He wished the by-law sent to the Town Solicitor so that it might go into effect Jan. 1st, but his colleagues were in a perverse mood and voted his motion down. It will probably be revived at next meeting.

Questions of Finance.
Ald. O'Reilly—"Now, Mr. Chairman of Finance, what is the amount of the present deficit? Is this your promised statement, showing a deficit of \$2,378.19 on 1st November?"
Ald. Cinnamon—"I guess that's about it." He then read the item, and wound up by saying, "Well, gentlemen, there's nothing very bad about a deficit if we have something to show for it."
Ald. O'Reilly—"Yes, we have that gravel on Kent-st."
Ald. Cinnamon—"I understood that was out of sight."
Ald. Robinson—"I move that the deficit be paid."
Ald. Cinnamon—"The Board of Works alone has exceeded its appropriation by \$2619.65—an amount in excess of the entire deficit."
Chairman Storer—"The Council ordered the Board of Works to make expenditures and I have to comply."
Ald. Robinson—"If the purchase of the lot for park purposes has not been effected it should be postponed. We have no money."

The request of Assessors Connelly and Spier for an increase of \$50 each in salary was next discussed.
Ald. Maunder—"Didn't they know what they were going to get?"
Ald. McGree—"Certainly, Fyfe it."

Moved by Ald. Cinnamon—"I don't think that is right—they are entitled to an increase and \$50 is little enough. They have done good work and increased the assessment about \$145,000."
Ald. McGree—"We can't afford to grant the increase."
Ald. Cinnamon—"We can always afford to pay good men well."
Ald. Robinson—"I fail to see how we can, in view of the deficit."
Ald. O'Reilly—"The assessment has been increased but there are dozens of appeals in, and the Court of Revision may cut off all increases."
Ald. Storer—"I am in favor of increasing their salaries, but I would say \$25 additional to each man."
Finally Ald. O'Reilly's suggestion—that the matter be left open till after the meeting of the Court of Revision—was approved.
The committees then adjourned.

Port Hope Versus Peterboro.
Both Governments are Asked to Spend Money on the Dams in Trent River.
A special and important meeting of the Trent Valley Canal Association was held in the Council chamber, Port Hope, last Friday afternoon. The meeting was called for the express purpose of taking some action regarding the two resolutions that had been passed by the Peterboro Board of Trade. The resolutions were as follows:
"That, in the manufacturing interests of the Trent waters and in the interests of navigation, it is urgently demanded that a large and constant flow of water be preserved in the Trent River (in its upper reaches named the Otonabee); that an intelligent control of the feed waters of the backwaters as well as secure a foot this end, and the Ontario and Ottawa Governments are respectfully, but urgently requested to secure such control and oversight of the dams on the backwaters as will secure a larger and more constant flow in the dry season."
Make a Protest.
After some discussion in which J. Alex. Culverwell took an important part, the following resolution was passed:
"That, whereas we learn that the Board of Trade of Peterboro, has passed resolutions urging upon the Government the expenditure of large

sums of money, estimated to be \$100,000, for the purpose of conserving the water of the back lakes by dams, already in existence and building others, and as from remarks made at that meeting, and our own observations, we know that the expenditure of Government money is not required in the interest of navigation."
"Therefore this meeting of the Port Hope Canal Association protests most strenuously against any expenditure of public money in improving the water-powers of the Trent Valley waters, north of Peterboro, until the southern connection of the canal with Lake Ontario is located and completed, and that a memorial be prepared by the officers of the association, and forwarded to the Government, conveying such protest."
