The deceased was dressed in a sealskin jacket and black skirt and was apparently about 50 years of age. The patrol wagon took the body home.

Mrs. Gray called upon Dr. Ball, Sherbourne street, on Saturday af- London, Ont. ternoon, about 2 o'clock, and received a bottle of medicine; after this time nothing is known as to her movements. James Boddy of Woodbine avenue states that he assisted a lady answering the description of deceased, who fell in a fit on Queen street a few weeks ago, and theory is that she had probably had another attack, and in her partial recovery wandered into the water. Mr. McEachren found tracks in the sand leading from the end of sidewalk on Woodbine avenue to the place where the body was discovered, and from the fact that rigor mortis had not set in was of the opinion that the accident, if it was an accident, must have taken place but a short time before the discovery of the

HON. J. A. DAVIDSON DEAD.

Provincial Treasurer of Manitoba Passes at His Home on Saturday.

Winnipeg, Nov. 16 .- Hon. John A. Davidson, Provincial Treasurer of Manitoba, passed away at his home at Neepawa, shortly after 9 o'clock Saturday morning, after a lingering

Mr. Davidson, M.P.P., for Beautiful Plains, was born at Thamesford, Oxford county, August 19, 1852, and reach of men without capital. went to Manitoba in 1872. He was first returned to the Legislative Assembly November 2, 1881, on the extension of the boundaries of the Province. He was re-elected at the general elections of 1883 and 1892, but an unsuccessful candidate at the general elections of 1886, 1888, 1896 and 1899. He entered the Macdonald Administration as Provincial Treasurer January 10, 1900, and was reelected to the Legislature at the byeelection March 10, 1900, the seat having been opened by the resignation, February 21, 1900, of R. C. Ennis, who had been returned at the general election. He accepted the same office in the Roblin Administration October 29, 1900, and was reelected at the general election of 1903. On January 20, 1878 he married at Palestine, Westbourne, Man., Sophia Ellen, daughter of Joseph Hamilton of Beautiful Plains, formerly of the County of Perth, Ont.
