

RESERVOIRS OF THE NORTH COUN-TRY UNDER DISCUSSION.

Mr. R. B. Rogers, Superintendent of

the Canal, Imparts Information. At a meeting of the Trent Valley Conservation Association, held in Peterboro lately, The Review states that "the important question of reserving and regulating the waters of northern reservoirs so as to maintain a sufficient and uniform flow along the roue of the Canal," and e her matters, were discussed. Mr. David Gilmour, of Trenton, was in the chair. We take from The Review the following synopsis of the discussion:

NORTHERN RESERVOIRS.

He stated that he had taken a trip ever the northern waters a few we ke ogo, and he had pictures and maps of the route taken, starting at Kashigawigamog Lake near Haliburton which was thirteen miles long, and while it could not be raised to any great extent, it could be regulated. There was a small dam at outlet which was not claimed by anyboy and no repairs were made on it. The capacity of the lake was 770 million cubic feet, and there was no reason why it should not be used as reservoir. Drag Lake was next visited. There was no settlement exc.pt at the upper end, where there were a few farmers.
